PROTEST TRANSFER OF ARAB FAMILIES

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- More than 1,000 families have been evacuated from refugee camps in the Gaza Strip and relocated in El Arish or elsewhere in the Sinai or Gaza Strip. They are being evacuated to clear the way for the building of access roads in the camps necessary for security puposes.

Washington (WNS) -- The State Department was charged with not really "giving a damn" about Soviet Jews by Representative Edward I. Koch, Democrat of New York, after it announced it would not support bills to provide 30,000 emergency visas for Soviet Jews.

David M. Abshire, Assistant Secretary of State for Congressional Relations, said there was no need for such legislation as the Attorney General had the authority to admit refugees in emergency situations. Koch, whose visa bill has

118 co-sponsors in the House of Representatives, (28 Senators have co-sponsored a similar bill in the Senate) charged the State Department position shows that it does not want to "antagonize the Soviet Union on the other matters," and allusion to current negotiations on Vietnam, Berlin, the Middle East, etc.

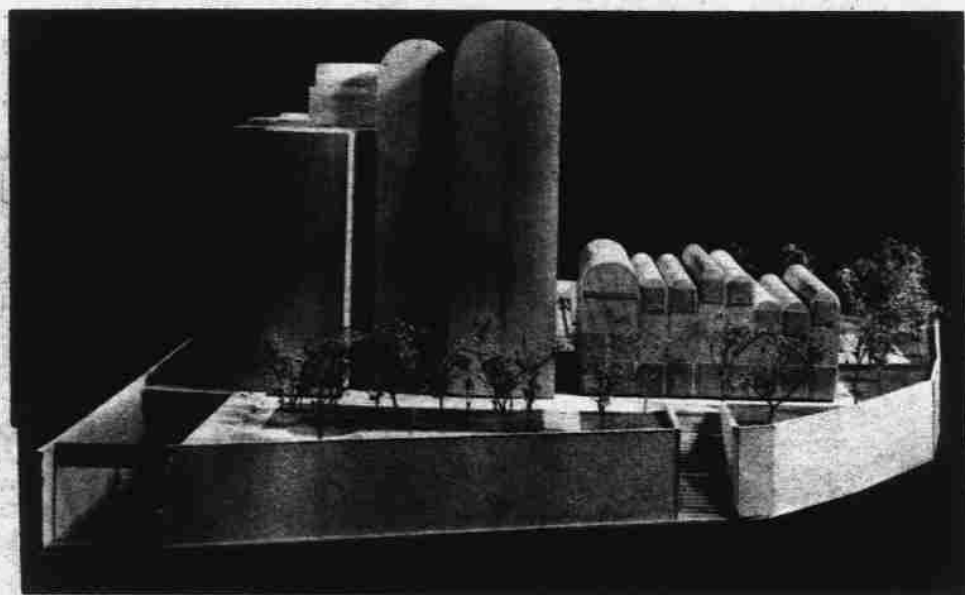
Koch, noting that in 1940, when Jews escaping Nazi Germany sought refuge in the U.S., "the State Department turned them away," said he would continue to work for passage of the legislation.

ARABS MORE HOSTILE TODAY

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, noting that "peace may be very late in coming" stated that Israel must regard herself as "the permanent regime" in the occupied Arab territories and

must take steps to carry out whatever projects are necessary.

Dayan noted that the Arab states were today more hostile than they had been after the War of Independence in 1948.
