JERUSALEM (WNS) --As World Zionist leaders "got down to business" on the second day of the 28th World Zionist Congress, veteran American Zionist leader Dr. Emanuel Neumann called on Jewish philanthropists to put greater stress on Jewish education in the diaspora to stem the "steady growth of assimilation, the constant drift away from the Jewish fold culminating often in intermarriage."

Prof. Abraham Joshua Heschel of the Jewish Theological Seminary, warning that the gulf between halacha and modern Jewish life was "widening and threatening world Jewry," called for a synthesis of

the "moral and ethical teachings" of the faith and its "purely legal aspects."

Prof. Albert Memmi of the Sorbonne, said that there were millions of persons who consider themselves Jews but do not want religious solutions to their daily lives, and declared "the Jewish national movement (Zionism) cannot be ruled by bodies and values which belong to a world which is no more." He also warned that social problems in Israel could be ignored only at the risk of internal explosion.

Rabbi Meir Kahane, chairman of the Jewish Defense League, left the Congress Hall peacefully after being

DAYAN ENCOURAGES PEACE

JERUSALEM (WNS) --In a television interview Defense Minister Moshe Dayan said that prospects for negotiations with Egypt were now "good" because Egyptian President Anwar Sadat realized he cannot move Israel by threats of war or pressure by the U.S.

Dayan said that Sadat realized that Israel's superior strength would make renewed warfare by Egypt a futile gesture and therefore Sadat can be expected to try to revive the (UN mediator Dr. Gunnar V.) Jarring Mission on his own terms -- which would require an Israeli commitment to withdraw to pre-June 1967 borders. If that failed, and it will, Dayan said, Sadat could be expected to try again to reach an agreement on an interim agreement that would permit the reopening of the Suez Canal.

In a radio interview, Foreign Minister Abba Eban said the only thing

holding up a renewal of the Jarring talks was Jarring's continued demand that Israel commit itself to withdrawal from occupied Arab territories prior to negotiations.

STATE OF UNION

WASHINGTON (WNS) --President Nixon, in his State of the Union message, told Congress the U.S. would "help other nations develop the capability of defending themselves," and the U.S. "will make only those (foreign) commitments we are able and prepared to meet."

Although Israel was not mentioned specifically, his remarks were viewed as including Israel in view of the State Department's recent announcement that the U.S. would aid Israel's weapons technology and that U.S.-Israeli talks are being held on the "modernization" of Israel's military potential.

ISRAELI ARAB POLICY SUPPORTED

NEW YORK--The Israeli government has the solid backing of its populace in its policies in dealing with the Arab states, a recently-concluded public opinion poll in the country shows.

The poll reports that 82.5 per cent of a national cross section of Israel's Jewish citizens say they think that the Israeli government is "doing all that it should to reach peace with the Arab states," while only 12.5 per cent think that the government should do more.

The poll, conducted by Public Opinion Research of Israel Ltd., was reported here by the American Jewish Committee, which releases reports of such surveys in this country. The poll is part of an

ongoing series of surveys of Israeli attitudes conducted by the American Jewish Committee as part of its program to build understanding between Israel and America. The program is implemented in Israel through the Committee's office in Jerusalem, directed by Dr. M. Bernard Resnikoff.

The survey also shows that recent immigrants to Israel are even more overwhelmingly united in backing the government's position on negotiations with the Arabs than are native-born Israelis.

Although both groups substantially endorse Premier Golda Meir's position, sabras (those who were born in the Jewish state) tend to be slightly more skeptical.
