communique issued after the completion of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's visit to Moscow called for a political solution to the Middle East crisis. They said Sadat had evidently failed to secure Soviet arms and backing for renewed warfare, at least at this time. They also noted the Soviet pledged support for Egypt but not for Sadat personally as they used to with the late Pres. Nasser, Some sources here believe the USSR is unhappy with Sadat and would like to see another, more pro-Soviet regime replace prohis.

Though the joint communique emphasized the need for a renewal of the Gunnar V. Jarring talks, circles here believed both Egypt and the Soviet Union were not "unalterably opposed" to an interim agreement reached through "close proxi-mity" talks between Egypt and Israel.

WASHINGTON (WNS) --In his third annual foreign policy report to Congress, Pres. Nixon accused the Soviet Union of responsibility for the current unrest in the Middle East and called upon the USSR to help avoid a "major conflict in the Middle East" by limiting its arms supply to its allies in the area, and to aid in achieving peaceful settlement in

the Arab-Israel conflict. In his 5,000 word, 236-page report titled, "United States Foreign Policy for the 1970s3--The Émerging Structure of Peace," the President revealed that through 1970, the Soviets had deployed in Egypt "eight surface-to-air missile installations, several squadrons or combat aircraft with (Continued on Page 3)

Purim, the gayest and most festive of all the Jewish holidays, will begin for all Jews at sundown, Monday, February 28.

Though the festival of Purim is actually derived from a biblical legend, the story of the Jewish Queen Esther who saved her people from annihilation by the Persian tyrant Haman, it has acquired a deeper significance for the Jewish people over the many centuries of its observance. The pattern of Jewish history has repeatedly been marked by the appearance of figures such as Haman -- whose anti-Semitic obsession and plan physically to destroy the Jewish community of Persia has tragically, unbelievably, found modern expression. Therefore, Jews on this day reaffirm their commitment to religious freedom for all people.

"We shall insist on having United Nations mediation through the UN mediator, Dr. Jarring, and on reenforcing this mediation which is the only possibility for a peaceful solution, he said.
