NEW YORK--The federations and welfare funds throughout the country, which collect and allocate funds for general Jewish communal needs, have been put on notice by the leaders of the United Synagogue of America that its growing chain of Solomon Schechter Day Schools must now begin to share in the disbursement of funds for Jewish education.

TEL AVIV (WNS)--After a stormy meeting, the National Religious Party leadership approved a compromise agreement worked out with the Labor Alignment that would permit new elections for the Chief Rabbinate. The agreement extends the terms of the present chief rabbis for six months.

BIRMINGHAM, ALA.--Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum, National Inter-religious Affairs Director of the American Jewish Committee, received a special award from Civitan International as part of its celebration of National Clergy Week. Rabbi Tanenbaum was awarded a plaque as "an outstanding representative of Judaism" at ceremonies to "commemorate the contributions of clergymen to the American community."

BONN (WNS)--Chancellor Willy Brandt has accepted an invitation from Israeli Premier Golda Meir to visit Israel. No date has been set.

JERUSALEM (WNS)--Some 200 persons were treated at hospitals and first aid stations for conditions ranging from frostbite to broken limbs as the city was brought to a standstill by the worst snowstorm in recent years.

NEW YORK--A Sephardic Cultural Festival will be held at Yeshiva University, 186th Street and Amsterdam Avenue, New York City, February 27, as the first event of the 28th annual nationwide Jewish Music Festival sponsored by the Jewish Music Council of the National Jewish Welfare Board.

JERUSALEM (WNS)--Officials of the Treasury, Defense and Foreign Ministries were studying the draft of an agreement under which France will reimburse Israel for the 50 Mirage V jets which were embargoed on the eve of the Six Day War in 1967, after they had been purchased by Israel.

NEW YORK (WNS)--Mrs. Charlotte Jacobson, a member of the Zionist Executive since the 27th World Zionist Congress, has been elected chairman of the American Section of the World Zionist Organization. Mrs. Jacobson had been president of Hadassah from 1964-68.

JERUSALEM (WNS)--The fact that President Nixon's foreign policy report does not include the ingredients of the Rogers Plan for Israeli withdrawal as part of an arrangement for solving the Israeli-Egyptian dispute was favorably commented upon by Minister-Without-Portfolio Israel Galili.

TEL AVIV (WNS)--Dr. Ammon Tzservinsky, 34, a rocket propulsion scientist at the Technion's Aeronautics Department, was killed in an explosion that wrecked the rocket propulsion laboratory at the Haifa institute.

UNITED NATIONS (WNS)--In an apparent change of mind, UN Secretary General Kurt Waldheim, declared that efforts to achieve an interim agreement to reopen the Suez Canal should be continued because it was "complementary" to the Jarring Mission.



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- Make sure you have the right size unit. If it is too small, it will run almost constantly and still not do a complete job. If it is too large, money is invested needlessly and the unit will not do a good job of controlling humidity.
- Set thermostat at best level for comfort and economy. During heating season, for every degree the thermostat is set below 72 degrees, the heating bill should be reduced about 5 per cent.
- Avoid changing the thermostat from one setting to another. The system will automatically maintain the desired comfort level.
- Change filters at least once a month, preferably every two weeks.
- Encourage children to close doors when they enter or leave the house.
- If you have large expanses of glass, like picture windows or sliding glass doors, close drapes

or curtains over them in the evening to prevent heat loss.

- Use the unit's fan continuously by setting the control switch to the "ON" position. By letting the fan run constantly, air in your home will be recirculated and will eliminate hot or cold pockets. It will also provide more air filtration.

- When cooking, turn on kitchen ventilation fan.

- When using the tub or shower, keep bathroom doors closed and ventilator on. If there is no vent fan, open the window a crack. This helps exhaust excess humidity to the outside.

- Try to achieve good insulation. A full insulated home will normally require from 20 to 40 per cent less energy than a home that is insulated to minimum standards.

- Above all, consult the manufacturer's manual for the proper use and maintenance of your air conditioning unit.



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
