## JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

SAN FRANCISCO--A "first" for the western United States is the founding of a kibbutz program for young people affiliated with Reform Temples, it was announced by Rabbi Morris M. Hershman, director of Swig Camp for Living Judaism in Saratoga, California.

NEW YORK--Israeli Finance Minister Pinhas Sapir returned to Israel after a round of appearances in major American cities on behalf of the 1972 campaign of the United Jewish Appeal and the Israeli Bond Organization.

MIAMI BEACH (WNS)--Israel's Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, speaking at an Israel Bond Organization luncheon here which raised more than \$6 million, told the 400 attending American and Canadian Bond leaders:

"Immigration is our top priority."

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- An authoratative Egyptian source attacked the Nixon Administration for adopting Israel's view of the Middle East situation and warned that before peace can come to the area there must be "a change in attitude by Israel," a change either by "the government or by new leadership." Stating that "we are not calling for a coup d'etat in Israel, but for an understanding of the realities not of today but of realities in the years to come. Israel's short-term gains could be a long-term loss," he noted,

PARIS (WNS)--Western and Arab diplomatic sources believe there is a possibility that Egypt may seek the aid of France in mediating a Middle East peace settlement.

BONN (WNS)--George Leber, Federal Minister for Postal Services, has agreed to issue a stamp on Dec. 13 in honor of the German Jewish poet, Heinrich Heine (1797-1856).

JERUSALEM (WNS).-The drilling of four holes and other construction work on the Western wall by Arab workers employed by the city has brought angry protests by Sephardic Chief Rabbi Itzhak Nissim and denials of responsibility from Jerusalem Mayor Teddy Kollek and the City Engineer.

NEW YORK (WNS)--Rabbi Israel Miller, president of the American Zionist Federation, hailed the bipartisan efforts in the Senate and House to aid Soviet Jews settle in Israel.

NEW YORK (WNS)--The 600 delegates attending the mid-winter conference of the National Committee for Labor Israel was told more than \$1 million in cash was raised in New York for the health, educational and social welfare programs of Histadrut.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Henry Ford II, head of the Ford Motor Co. is making his first visit to Israel on a weeklong trip sponsored by the United Jewish Appeal.

LONDON (WNS)--A Jewish leader here denied that there was "a single word of truth" in the report carried by a local Jewish weekly that there was a connection between the Irish Republican Army and Arab terrorists.

LONDON (WNS) -- The Board of Governors of the Jewish Agency adopted a record \$775 million budget recommended by the Agency Executive meeting here.

JERUSALEM (WNS)--The announcement by the Zim Lines that it was opening a new service to the Far East via the Panama Canal brought about a strike of dock workers at Eilat that paralyzed the port and threatened to shut down the Eilat-Ashkelon pipeline.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- B'nai B'rith President David M. Blumberg in a letter to Secretary General Kurt Waldheim, has urged the United Nations to reach agreement on an "authoritative standard" for determining acts of agression.

TEL AVIV (WNS)--David Ben Gurion told a meeting of Hagana veterans that an Israeli scientist apent 1963 An Communist China belping the Peking government solve a problem.

## LAS VEGAS ISRAELITE

PARIS (WNS)--Reports that Darquier De Pellepoix, a notorious Nazi collaborator during World War II, who had been living in Spain under political asylum since 1944, and had been sentenced to death by a military court in Dec. 1947 in absentia, might return to France, has drawn vigorous protests from two major Jewish-French organizations. The death sentence expired in 1969.

NEW YORK (WNS)--Manhattan State Supreme Court Justice Irving H. Saypol has ordered a halt to the construction of the controversial 840-unit low income public housing project in Forest Hills.

LONDON (WNS)--Lord Sieff of Brimpton, a leading Zionist, Jewish scholar, businessman and philanthropist, died here at the age of 83.

JOHANNESBURG (WNS) -- A story by the Sunday Express that Esso-Standard Oil Co., of South Africa had refused to hire a job applicant, Sharon Harber, because she is Jewish, was denied by the company's managing director.

BROOKLYN (WNS)--In response to growing protests from the Jewish communities, Pres. John W. Kneller announced that Brooklyn College was withdrawing the questionnaire requiring students to answer questions dealing with race, religion and ethnic origin.

NEW YORK (WNS)--In a television interview on the CBS program "Face The Nation," Israel's Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan said that even after a peace treaty was signed with Jordan Israel should have the right to build Jewish settlements in the West Bank because it was "part of the Jewish Homeland." He also said Israel would not return East Jerusalem, Sharm el-Sheikh and the Golan Heights.

NEW YORK (WNS)--Rabbi Bernard Bamberger, president of the World Union for Progressive Judaism, the international body of Reform Judaism in 25 countries, announced the Union's headquarters would be transferred from New York to Jerusalem in July, 1973 "to strengthen the progressive movement there...to obtain recognition as a valid interpretation of Judaism."



- Make sure you have the right size unit. If it is too small, it will run almost constantly and still not do a complete job. If it is too large, money is invested needlessly and the unit will not do a good job of controllling humidity.
- Set thermostat at best level for comfort and economy. During heating season, for every degree the thermostat is set below 72 degrees, the heating bill should be reduced about 5 per cent.
- Avoid changing the thermostat from one setting to another. The system will automatically maintain the desired comfort level.
- Change filters at least once a month, preferably every two weeks.
- Encourage children to close doors when they enter or leave the house.
- If you have large expanses of glass, like picture windows or sliding glass doors, close drapes

- or curtains over them in the evening to prevent heat loss.
- Use the unit's fan continuously by setting the control switch to the "ON" position. By letting the fan run constantly, air in your home will be recirculated and will eliminate hot or cold pockets. It will also provide more air filtration.
- When cooking, turn on kitchen ventilation fan.
- When using the tub or shower, keep bathroom doors closed and ventilator on. If there is no vent fan, open the window a crack. This helps exhaust excess humidity to the outside.
- Try to achieve good insulation. A full insulated home will normally require from 20 to 40 per cent less energy than a home that is insulated to minimum standards.
- Above all, consult the manufacturer's manual for the proper use and maintenance of your air conditioning unit.
