Hank at it Again

Have we got a pip for you this week! The cast of characters includes our Las Vegas mayor and the four city commissioners, the president and chairman of the board of a multimillion dollar corporation, an unnamed person who could be the subject of a criminal indictment, two newspaper columnists and last, but not least, you guessed it, the publisher of the Las Vegas Sun.

At stake is the re-instatement of the gambling licenses, which netted some \$700,000 last year, for a public held stock corporation.

Before we delve into particulars, with names, places, times, situations and backgrounds, we are compelled to state one more generality. Despite the incompatible relationship, heretofore, between the Israelite and the Sun, which will_continue until that imitation of a newspaper discontinues its nefarious practices, we find ourself in the incongruous position of seeking the same goal as the Sun publisher, namely, the relicensing of the company. Our methods to achieve this result vary, and thereby hangs this tale.

Two items appeared recently in separate Sun columns, one by Ruthe Deskin, the other by Paul Price. We wince at the sacrilegiousness of coupling Ruthe in the same vein with Paul. Her misgiving was an innocent ignorance of the background of the item she ran. His was a deliberate, outrageous, atrocious attempt, by innuendo, as he so often practices, to discredit hard working, sincere public officials, whom our research in this matter revealed are 100% honest.

Ruthe and Paul are disciples of "Godfather" Hank Greenspun, power and money hungry (or visa versa) publisher of the Las Vegas Sun, and each seeks to extoll the virtues of their boss, naturally. While Ruthe is understanding, highprincipled and respected, Paul is arrogant, deceitful and detested. (Incidentally, our invitation to the upcoming marriage of Paul's daughter probably went astray in the mail, but we do, in this respect, sincerely wish every happiness to Paul and his darling Dottie and, of course, the marriage couple.)

Ruthe, in her column, chided the rival daily, the Review-Journal for bemoaning the lack of attendance at an open-to-the-public Budget hearing of the City Commission. Greenspun was there, plainly on view, in the R-J photo. Ruthe pointed out what a spirited citizen was
