"There will not be another war with the Arabs," insists General Uzi Narkiss, whose forces liberated Jerusalem during the 6 Day War.

"Arabs are not our real enemies," the Gen. told the Las Vegas Israelite in an exclusive interview. "The real enemy is Russia."

The general reasoned that because Russia is not certain of an Arab victory, they are hesitant about forcing the Arabs into another war. "The Russians do not want to leave the Middle East. They want only to keep the conflict alive."

"Sadat," Gen. Narkiss said "would like to disengage from Russia. The Egyptian leader is being forced to repeat the threats aga-

MESSAGE BY THE PRIME MINISTER MRS. GOLDA MEIR ON ISRAEL'S TWENTY-FOURTH INDEPENDENCE DAY.

On the threshold of the Twenty-Fourth Anniversary of our independence, we can look back on an eventful year in Israel's life and in that of World Jewry.

The uneasy cease-fire which came into being some nineteen months ago is continuing. This was primarily due to the growing realization in the Arab world that renewed aggression of warfare against us is bound to fail in the future as it has failed in the past. We owe this to the bravery of the Israel Defense Forces and the steadfastness of the Israeli people.

We have witnessed what is surely one of the miracles of Jewish history of all times. Soviet Jewry, which had been cut off from the mainstream of our people for almost two generations, decided to stand up for its rights under the most trying circumstances and demanded to be reunited with their brethren in our homeland. We have been privileged to witness the homecoming of many of them during the last months.

In the Arab world the isolated remnants of once great Jewish communities have continued to bear the brunt of persecution and oppression. From there, too, immigrants have found their way to us, and it has been our privilege to welcome them in our midst.

From the countries of the West more and more people, including many young people, have decided to tie their future to the land of Israel and to actively participate in the great drama of building a land and people.

In Israel the work of development and up-building has continued apace. Together with our efforts devoted to the absorption of new immigrants, we have increased our work in raising the standards of some of the less privileged sectors of our population by making sure that the levels of their housing, education, health, and social services continue to rise and to improve.

Our exports have increased substantially as has production in general. The social and economic infrastructure of the country has been broadened and widened. New villages have been established and older ones developed. Industry and agriculture have continued to develop and the fruit of our land is finding its way to more and more countries.

As we face the new year which will bring us to the Twenty-Fifth anniversary of our re-

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL SERVICES

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Premier Golda Meir and Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, speaking at separate Holocaust Memorial services, said the lessons of the Holocaust must be applied to assure Israel's future security.

Mrs. Meir, speaking at a ghetto fighters kibbutz in Western Galilee said, "We must learn the lesson of the Holocaust. Before the eyes of the whole world it was possible to murder and

burn six million people. From that bitter, unprecedented experience we must know that we cannot rely on anyone. We can rely only on ourselves."

Dayan, speaking at Yas Mordecai, a kibbutz north of the Gaza Strip said that the purpose of remembering the Holocaust was not merely to ensure that it is not forgotten, but to ensure that it will never happen again.

Holocaust services were held throughout the Western world including New York, Toronto, Brussels, Amsterdam, Rumbuli near Riga, and Buenos Aires.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Maj. Gen. David Elazar Israel's Chief of Staff, told graduating artillery cadets, that Israeli troops will remain on the banks of the Suez Canal despite the new long range artillery (MMV-107) received from the U.S. "They are not intended to draw you back from the cease-fire line but to extend your fire power deeper into enemy territory," he said.
