

All Mr. Hughes Hotels A member of Mrs. Now Operating in Black

Last week, for the first time, the full seven Howard Hughes Nevada casinos, hotel-casinos commenced operating in the black,

The last to get on the credit side of the ledger was the Castaways, the smallest of the casino-hotel operations. Three weeks ago, the Desert Inn, the first Hughes casino-hotel, began registering a profit.

Now the whole story may be told.

We all know that Howard Hughes is a most unusual man, with far more not known about his personal life and business activities than has been written by profit-seeking "biographers and

a phoney "autobiographer." But certain facts are evident from the circumstances surrounding the story of Hughes in Nevada. It is a story of multi-million dollar cash transactions at a time when the country was economically depressed. It is a story of misplaced confidence in a man, with the power of the check-book pen, who Hughes described as "robbing me blind." It is the story of the most corrupt newspaper publisher in America snatching in excess of \$10,000,000 in cash under most unusual and suspicious circumstances while "working" for the billionaire, but as soon as the cash flow stopped, commenced the most vicious campaign of hate propaganda and character assassination ever perpetrated in the annals of journalism. It is the story of a stubborn governor, elected by the corrupt publisher who created obstacles to harass and embarass Hughes, and most important, served to undermine the confidence of 8,000 employees in the security of their jobs. And finally, it is a story of a state gambling commission, acting under the influence of the corrupt publisher and the stubborn governor, refusing to license the designated persons so that the largest business in the state can be properly operated to function smoothly.

Despite all this, Hughes was determined to stick it out, and he emerged successful. Only Hughes could have sustained. Other big business, in the gambling industry, involved in stock transactions, mergers, huge bank loans and promoted investors, would and did run at the first sign of financial set-back. Not Hughes, who kept pouring in more and more money, maintaining

full staffs, meeting all obligations.

Through it all Hughes did not neglect his
