The TV "Hee Haw" star Ray Clark will be on tap for Country Music fans at the LANDMARK until July 4, supported by "The Happiest Girl" number 1 recording star Donna Fargo and The Sound Generation. They will be followed by Patti Page until Aug. 1 and then Bobbie Gentry until Aug. 29. The LANDMARK boasts the highest paying nickel, dime and quarter slot machines in Nevada, up to \$12,400 for 25 cents.

Presently singing his heart out at the FRONTIER is Robert Goulet, to be followed on June 22 by Bob Newhart. "Mr. Entertainment" Wayne Newton comes in on July 20, and then on Aug. 24, The Supremes. The FRONTIER has classes for all games of chance and those who attend receive buttons and get special attention from the dealers.

The SILVER SLIPPER, in the heart of everything, is strictly for the gamblers, with a side-splitting burlesque show, The Wonderful World of Burlesque, that has been turning away patrons for more than three years. Shifting Considerations

Dr. Nahum Goldmann's statement at the opening session of the Governing Council of the World Jewish Congress that Jews must take into account the growing importance of the Communist bloc nations and the Third World for their future, is a reflection of shifting considerations. He also said that the democratic nations with which Jewish survival has been traditionally connected are losing their influence and power.

While Dr. Goldmann and Louis Pincus, President of the World Zionist Organization said their organizations agreed on the centrality of Israel in Jewish life, Dr. Goldmann's statement requires a re-consideration of attitudes. The bulk of Jews in the communist bloc reside in the Soviet Union. His concern for their ethnic rights is related to the fact that most Jews will remain in the Soviet Union. And Dr. Goldmann's thesis that this is as important as the concern for their right of egress has caused some flak to be shot in his direction.

But there are that many Jews in the Soviet Union, the thesis relates to what has been referred as autonomous and creative diasporas. Doubtless, the overall political situation in the Middle East, as well as the failure of any peaceful solution to come out of the Moscow Mission of President Nixon will serve to emphasize the need for a re-examination of Jewish concerns and priorities.

Wallace Problem

A shrewd student of social and economic ills plaguing our modern, overpopulated, air-polluted, slum-scarred society has observed: "We drain the marshes only when the mosquitoes bite the rich."

Applying that rule of human nature to America's battle with violence, we may conclude with great hope that now that George Wallace himself has been the unfortunate victim of fiendish violence, America will finally "drain the marshes" wherein violence breeds.

Governor Wallace has gained a portion of his amazing popularity on his demand for "law and order." Back in late 1970, citing an FBI report on spiraling crime, he complained: "Both the Democrats and the Republicans have been telling us what they are going to do for us, but all that they have done is to put us in a mens unequal in all history."

So now, with the southern crusader himself felled by easily-obtained bullets fired from a readily-purchased pistol, surely we have every right to look to the Governor's frenzied followers for the magic formula for ending violence.

Will a part of the solution be a gun-control law? The Senate is moving in that direction, spurred by the Wallace tragedy. Even Chicago's Mayor Richard J. Daley, a hero to many members of the National Rifle Association (long on arguments against gun control), has now (in the name of God as he puts it) demanded such a reform. And perhaps passage of legislation outlawing snub-nosed pistols might help vindicate former Senator Joseph D. Tydings who lost election the last time round chiefly because he espoused such a gun law with such fervor. Tydings lost in Maryland where Wallace was shot. And even there, time may catch up with the need for stricter laws to curb violence.

Governor Wallace is wrong, of course, in blaming most Republicans and Democrats for failing to stop crime in the streets.

Many who now swell the ranks of Wallace voters and are deeply touched by his injuries (as all sensitive citizens are), should get on with the business of examining the Wallace record closely. Some who read this may wish to mull these points:

1. Addressing a German-born American audience on his way up, the Governor said he was sorry we had to fight in World War II against those "anti-Communist nations --- Germany and Japan...I thought that back then, hell, we should have been in those trenches with the German, fightin' them Bolsheviks."

2. In October, 1967, he said in Virginia that he would continue to welcome the support of the Ku Klux Klan. The next year, when Wallace was a candidate for President, a Wallace bodyguard seized and kept a TV film showing the Governor warmly embracing Bob Shelton, Imperial Wizard of the United Klans of America.

3. In 1969, Wallace publicly endorsed the Christian Crusade movement operated by Billy Jim Hargis, whose religious and racial prejudices are all too readily documented.

4. In October, 1968, Joseph Alsop, one of America's most conscientious and conservative journalists, wrote: "The truth of the matter is that the Wallace movement is ...in embryo, at least, the first successful Fascist movement America has ever seen."

At late as March of this year, a third of the people polled listed Wallace as "a dangerous demagogue." Yet here he is, garnering delegates with ease as he panders to prejudice and, with superb cunning, promises to lead the angry people, the frustrated ones, the heavily-taxed, and those a brim with grievances on to the Wallace Promised Land.

A little more martyrdom, a few more conventions delegates, an additional bit of power; and this politician, who has indicated he would wish to put Senators Stennis and Talmadge in his cabinet along with Max Rafferty while toying with the ideas of designating mayor Frank Rizzo of Philadelphia to head the FBI --- this well-financed candidate with a gorgeously-organized campaign, seems nearly certain to succeed in keeping either major party candidates from obtaining the 270 or more electoral votes necessary for election. And thus he could bargain away the Presidency of the U.S.
