TEL AVIV (WNS) --Kozo Okamoto, the Japanese terrorist captured during the Lydda Airport massacre, accepted Max Kritzman of Tel Aviv as his defense attorney at a pre-

liminary hearing conducted by the threemember military tribunal which will conduct his trial. The hearing was held to hear testimony from Jose Abner Muno Vega, leader of the Puerto Rico pilgrim group which suffered the greatest casualties in the airport shootings, who was returning to Puerto Rico and did not know if he could return to Israel for the Kritzman said trial. Okamoto's trial would be delayed for at least two weeks and hinted that he may base his defense on insanity whether Okamoto cooperated or not.

Okamoto's two companions, who were killed during the massacre, were buried at an undisclosed site in southern Israel in the presence of a Japanese Embassy official.

Isadore Stern, 70, who sustained leg and abdominal injuries during the shooting, died June He was the 25th massacre victim.
