### DANGERS TO ISRAELI ECONOMY

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Three Israeli officials concerned with the nation's economy warned of danger signs on the

horizon. Finance Minister Pinhas Sapir told the Herut Social and Economic club that a recession such as occurred in 1966 could be prevented only if steps are taken to curb the inflationary trend and the public ends its buying spree.

Gen. Haim Bar Lev, Minister of Commerce and Industry, told a meeting of the kibbutz industries that while Israeli industry has made giant strides it is not yet a healthy industry because it suffers from lack of modern production methods and does not enjoy cordial labor relations.

Moshe Aanbar, Governor of the Bank of Israel told the Labor Council Club that while Israel's economy has registered a 40 percent increase in exports during the past two years, more attention must be paid to efficiency.

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- After eight hours of debate last week, the Security Council was expected to meet June 26 to vote on a demand by Lebanon that it voice "strong condemnation" of Israel for "persistent acts of aggression." The Lebanese demand is reportedly supported by China, France, Somalia, Sudan, USSR and Yugoslavia. The U.S. has indicated it would oppose any "one-sided" condemnation of Israel. U.S. Ambassador George Bush told the Security Council the U.S. wants any resolution to be "fair and balanced" and to "indicate concern" for terrorist acts as well as acts by Israel.

Lebanon's complaint against Israel came in the wake of three Israeli raids into the "Fatahland" region of southern Lebanon during which five high-ranking Syrian intelligence officer were captured. The raids, and accompanying air

and artillery bombardment followed three separate terrorist acts which wounded four Israeli soldiers and two civilians.

(In Jerusalem, Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban told the Cabinet under consideration by the Security Council was "one sided" and would encourage the Arabs to continue their aggression against Israel.)

During the UN debate the Soviet and Chinese Ambassadors denounced Israel for "wanton provocation," while Lebanon demanded that Israel return the captured Syrian officers who, the Lebanese and Syrians Ambassadors claimed, were vacationing in Lebanon when captured. Israel's Ambassador Yosef Tekoah charged the Syrian officers the Syrian officers were members of a joint reconnaissance mission organized by Lebanon "to collect military data and work on guidelines for future operations" against Israel. He ac-

### TRIAL FOR JAPANESE KILLER

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Kozo Okamoto, the Japanese terrorist captured during the Lydda Airport massacre, accepted Max Kritzman of Tel Aviv as his defense attorney at a pre-

liminary hearing conducted by the three-member military tribunal which will conduct his trial. The hearing was held to hear testimony from Jose Abner Muno Vega, leader of the Puerto Rico pilgrim group which suffered the greatest casualties in the airport shootings, who was returning to Puerto Rico and did not know if he could return to Israel for the trial. Kritzman said Okamoto's trial would be delayed for at least two weeks and hinted that he may base his defense on insanity whether Okamoto cooperated or not.

Okamoto's two companions, who were killed during the massacre, were buried at an undisclosed site in southern Israel in the presence of a Japanese Embassy official.

Isadore Stern, 70, who sustained leg and abdominal injuries during the shooting, died June 21. He was the 25th massacre victim.
