We can safely say that we Jews have "made" it.

By that I mean that we have established ourselves as an important element in American life.

Jews have status. Judaism has prestige. Our position is so solid that we can sustain without the nervousness of bygone years our AMOUR PROPRE even when we read about malefactions Jews. by

In previous years we used to "tzitter" i.e. shiver, when a Jewish criminal was publicized. or when Israel was censured. Now we are calmer about it.

Indeed, Jewishness is now regarded as so "beautiful" that more and more non-Jews want Jewish spouses. .

And they are perfectly willing to have a Jewish wedding ceremony even if they themselves do not turn Jewish at the point of matrimony.

That is, indeed, what is behind the current mixed marriage flurry.

Alarmists are wont to say that the incidence of marriages of Jews and non-Jews betoken a blow to Judaism.

It's just the reverse. More and more couples prefer a Jewish religious ceremony because it's more meaningful than others. Even marginal Jews now want a rabbi to officiate, and their non-Jewish partners are perfectly willing because it's now more fashinable to be involved in something Jewish.

So weep not for the decline in Judaism. Rejoice that the situation is brighter than it ever was.

Mixed Marriage

Orthodox and Conservative rabbis flatly refuse to officiate at marriages in which one of the partners is not Jewish. But such rites occur with fair frequency in this country. Obviously only Reform rabbis will perform them and it had been generally assumed the number of such willing rabbis was small. But the recent 83rd convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis heard a research finding that no less than 41 percent of Reform rabbis have officiated or do officiate at such weddings.

It is worth stressing that about half of the willing Reform rabbis insist that, as a condition for their officiating, the prospective couple must agree to some minimum conditions, such as committing themselves to creating a Jewish home and to raising their children as Jews. The others presumably do it for what reportedly are substantial fees.

ban the practice, the delegates voted to put the issue over to the next convention. Apart from the proposition that such officiating violates Jewish Religious Law and apart from the conviction of many rabbis of all three branches that such weddings are destructive of Jewish life, how can the pro-mixed-marriage Reform rabbis justify their sanction of such unions?

One of the reasons cited at the CCAR convention for postponement of action on a ban was that in fact very little is known as to what happens to such marriages. What if further research provides evidenced that the commitments made to induce Reform rabbis to officiate are in fact generally carried out? Suppose the evidence shows that the children of such unions get at least as good a Jewish education as those from normal Jewish unions?

It remains true that children of mixed marriages may have problems getting married to Jews if that turns out to be their adult goal. But it is also true that in the loosely structured minimum-Jewish-demand structure of American Jewry, it would be optimistic indeed to assert that most children of all-Jewish unions are Jewishly committed and dedicated in faith and behavior to Judaism.

From the standpoint of Jewish Religious Law, such marriages are not Jewish marriages and the children are not Jewish. But if the promised research proves that such children are no less Jewish by all practical yardsticks than their guaranteed Jeiwh peers -- biologically -maybe there is a case for not driving young couples from the fold even before they have a chance to prove they really want to be in it.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- The Governing Council of the World Jewish Congress expressed "an-xiety" over the plight of Soviet Jewry at its closing session here and called for a world wide commemoration of the 20th anniversary of the massacre of Jewish intellectuals in the Soviet Union.
