After various concert versions in and out of Los Angeles, we were finally treated to a full scale version of the immensely popular rock opera at the New Universal Amphitheater. Super applause to TEDDY NEELEY who made Jesus a sensitive, warm, human, appealing (even sexually appealing judging by some of the female comments afterwards) and an unforgettable character. Even dyed-in-the-wool atheists had to dig Neeley's interpretation. Neeley has been signed by NORMAN JEWISON to repeat his role in the movie version which will go before the cameras in August in Israel and there's not one doubt in my mind that he'll be magnificent. I have a sneaking suspicion that Neeley must have trouble getting accident insurance. I first saw him in "Hair" where he was dragged across the stage all night, then in "Tommy" (which is my opinion has been the BEST rock opera) and again he had a strenuous role and now of course the epitome, he's crucified on stage. CARL AN-DERSON (who'll also do the movie) as Judas was terrific and HEATHER MAC RAE need never worry about just being know as GORDON and SHEILA MAC RAE's little girl, she's perfect as Mary Magdalene. I don't mean that Jesus Christ Superstar doesn't have its' faults, it does but the overall effect especially the ending scene on a giant cross which is probably one of the most breath taking theatrical moments that I

have ever seen adds up to great entertainment.
