TOM MULROY FOR STATE SENATE

Former Registrar of Voters Tom Mulroy has announced that, upon the urging of many persons in and out of public life he has decided to file election to the Nevada State Senate for one of the four seats open in Senate District Three. "Upon my retirement from office on June 1st," Mulroy said, it was my intention to pursue only my personal interests. However, many friends, in all areas of the community, have urged me to continue my public service. "It was indeed rewarding to be commended by the news media

"for a job well done" and the kind expressions received from civic groups, both political parties and public officials. "It is nice, of course to be commended, but whatever service I was privileged to give, during the years, is no less than any citizen is properly entitled to. "I will offer a resume of my qualification at the time of my formal filing and also outlining a program to deal with the concerns so many citizens have about local and state government."

Boyd Bulloch Seeks Slot On Commission

North Las Vegas businessman and former City Councilman Boyd C. Bulloch, has filed for the post of Clark County Commissioner in District B. Bulloch, a Democrat, is presently a commissioner on the Water District, having served two years of a four year elected term. "However, with the new Legislative set-up whereby shortly all seven county commissioners will take over the functioning of the Water District, and no new water commissioners being elected per se, I believe my past experience can be most helpful and am looking to be elected in order to continue on," he stated. "We have made great strides in the past two years with the installation of four new pumping stations which have greatly benefited all of Clark County but especially North Las Vegas,"

Bulloch pointed out. "With the constant expansion of North Las Vegas, it is necessary that someone familiar with the entire procedure, someone with the experience I now have, to retain a seat on the Water District and this, hopefully, I will do when elected." Boyd Bulloch and his wife, Patricia, are both natives of Boulder City, having moved to North Las Vegas 13 years ago. The parents of 9 children ranging from 2 to 16 in ages, both Boyd and his wife are active with children's groups. Of great pride is his association with the Community College, helping to obtain, along with Assemblyman Dave Branch, 80 acres in North Las Vegas on which the college will ultimately be built. BILBRAY FOR U. S. CONGRESS

University Regent James Bilbray, calling for a return of politics to the people, today filed for Nevada's lone seat in the U.S. House of Representatives. Bilbray, a Democrat, was accompanied by his wife, Michaelene and their three children, when he paid the \$150 fee and filed his candidacy papers with the office of Secretary of State John Koontz. The 34 - year - old attorney thus took a formal step in his bid to return to Washington where he served as a Capitol Hill police officer and a member of the staff of U.S. Sen. Howard W. Cannon while working his way through law school.

"The time is long overdue," Bilbray said, "for a return to honesty in our political system, a policy envisioned by the authors of that most enduring of all documents, the U.S. Constitution." "The time also is long overdue," he added, "for Nevada to be represented in the U.S. House by a firm voice

and I wish to continue having that same hand in at the county commissioner level." He affirms, "The only promise I will make and assure you I will keep is to represent my constituents fully and honestly without regard for personal gain." Bulloch has an extensive background in public service, having served as mayor pro-tem for the City of North Las Vegas, vice chairman on the Governor's Ground Water Board for Clark County for nine years, vice president of the Nevada Municipal Association, a director of the American Cancer Society and a district chairman for the United Fund.

"I believe," said Bilbray, "that Nevadans have grown weary of representation by self-serving press release, that as citizens of this state we have a right to demand that we be represented in the House by action and candor not by absence and politically expedient rhetoric."

"The 1970's are not ordinary times and 1972 is not an ordinary election year," Bilbray declared. "The man and women entrusted with high public office must be responsive to the people and their needs, in these extraordinary times of the growth of our nation and our state."

"I would hope that the 1972 congressional campaign will produce a dialogue between the candidates so that the voters will have a genuine basis on which to make their judgment at the ballot box," Bilbray said.

CANDIDATES INVITED TO SUBMIT RESUMES

Tom Hickey - Candidate Assembly District #18

Prominent North Las Vegas civic leader Tom Hickey filed, Monday, as a democratic candidate for the Assembly in District 18. Hickey, 42, is a twelve year resident of North Las Vegas and lives with his father at 805 Glendale. A veteran railroader, Hickey also operates Tom Hickey Recreation, a snowmobile facility.

An active member of the community, Hickey has been a constant strong voice for North Las Vegas and is a member of the North Las Vegas Lions, Optimists, Rancho High Boosters, and American Legion. He also serves as president of the Hi-Nooner Toastmasters and is an honorary member of the NLV Jay Ceas.

Hickey recently proposed to the NLV City Council that NLV create and adopt a flag of its own. The council unanimously approved the idea and appointed Hickey to a committee which has formulated plans for a flag design contest.

In an opening statement to a group of supporters, made just prior to filing for office, Hickey expressed deep concern for the continuing crime rise in Clark County. "As a member of the 1972 Clark County Grand Jury", he explained, "the gravity of the crime picture has left a deep impression upon me, and as my campaign unravels, I most certainly will bring to my constituents a plan for legislative action to combat this problem and rid the community of the violent crime epidemic which has attacked our people."

Hickey also issued a warning to all North Las Vegas to hold firm against the impending consolidation or one city government legislation which surely will be introduced during the 1973 session of the Nevada State Legislature.

Charging that forces outside the City of North Las Vegas were trying to violate the sovereignty and eradicate the borders of NLV, Hickey pointed to the continuing rate of growth in the city which ranks as the third largest in the state. "There have been concerted efforts by Las Vegas and Clark County officials to berate and embarrass us", Hickey claimed, "and implying that we are a second rate city wherein 50,000 second class citizens reside. Our people are proud to be residents and property owners in NLV", he added, "and I will never be involved in the surrender of our sovereignty, under any circumstances."

Hickey concluded his remarks with the mention that his platform will include concerns for senior citizens, consumer protection legislation, and the development of a program to curb the high auto accident rate in Nevada.
