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Israel's four schools of social work have formed a council to coordinate their activities and utilize their limited resources more effectively, it was reported by Samuel L. Haber, Executive Vice-Chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee. Dr. Shimon Spiro, Director of Tel Aviv University School of Social Work, is Chairman of the Council.

The Council consists of representatives of each of the social work schools plus the Ministry of Welfare's Institute of Social Work. It receives half of its annual budget of \$12,000 from Malben, the JDC health and welfare program maintained in Israel with United Jewish Appeal funds.

Mr. Haber also noted that JDC established the first social work school in Israel, the Paul Baerwald School at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, which, in turn, helped to found simi-lar schools at the Tel Aviv and Haifa Universities; the fourth social work school is part of the Bar-Ilan University in Tel Aviv.

The Council meets regularly and issues a bulletin thus keeping the schools monthly informed of the others' plans and activities and thereby avoiding duplication, Mr. Haber said. New courses, staff appointments and results of newly completed studies are thus made known regularly to each of the representatives.

Each school tends to develop new approaches in its specialized area, Mr Haber stated. The Jerusalem and Haifa schools stress the casework system,
