Mrs. Meir suggested that if Sadat found intolerable the "no-war-no-peace" situation he could end it by making peace directly with Is-rael because "no foreign country or factor can solve for us, or instead of us, the problems which stand between us . . . Negotiation for peace is not a badge of surrender or humiliation. . . It is responsibility," she said.

Israeli experts estimate that as many as 8,000 of the 17,000 Soviet experts and military personnel stationed in Egypt may be withdrawn, including advisors and technicians at the Aswan High Dam which was designed and built by Soviet engine-

(In Washington, Rep. Peter Peyser (R., N.Y.) told the House that the reduction of Soviet personnel in Egypt was "encouraging" but "other recent state-ments" by Sadat "have demonstrated this is an appropriate time for the U.S. to reaffirm its commitment to support the State of Israel.")

(The State Department refused to comment on Sadat's charges that America had promised to pressure Israel to withdraw from the occupied territories and then broke the promise, instead increasing its aid to Israel.) was voted.
