"One Man Plus The Truth Constitutes A Majority"

(A reader in Kirkland, Washington, reminds us of the area set aside by Russia for Jews in 1934. The project was unsuccessful for many obvious reasons. We do not agree, but here is the version submitted for what its worth, J.T.)

Mr. Krushchev in 1957 stated that the Jewish Birobidzhan project had to be regarded as a failure, - but, should we not, eff-sharr, make ourselves take another look?

The Chinese would consider it "good earth"; so also the Russians. For Jews, the settlement problems are basically like those of all the other good earth" in the world - Israel, New York, London, Paris, the Argentine - and all the rest included - - - so long as religious freedom and the hopes of Messianic univeralisms are kept glowing bright.

A Russian- Chinese - Jewish confrontation there could be of world-wide concern. I could become a situation highly pregnant with meaning for all man-kind. How? Why? -- Let me try to make it plain.

This world-wide publicized Russian-de-signated "Jewish Autonomous Region" of the USSR was established in 1934. And in 1948, 30,000 Jews were settled there in a total population of 160,000 in its 14,000 square miles. The estimated population in 1961 was 180,000 - in which the Jewish population diminished to about 15,000. But the Russian government could today be still anxious for its possible success.

The region is almost twice the size of modern Israel exclusive of the since-1967-administered territories. Zev Vilnay's "Guide to Israel" for 1972 gives 34,493 square miles as inclusive of those territories , the whole therewith larger than our Massachusetts, Connecticut Rhode Island, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland combined. What may be the composition of a Birobidzahn possible success?

There are many elements. South of the Amur is the teeming population of land-hungry China, eyeing covetously the Siberian emptyness on the river's other side. Only the Russian

army provides security.

Though the country is less primitive than was in the fortys, fifties, and sixties it is primitive still. But there exists enormous potential.

The key to unlocking that potential is in pro-(Continued on Page 4)
