JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The State Depart-ment agreeted with "no comment" the announced plans of Egypt and Libya to establish a "unified political leadership" to unite the two countries.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Israel's Ambassador to the U.S., Yitzhak Rabin told members of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations that in line with a longstanding practice not to intervene in internal domestic politics of other countries, Israel will remain non-partisan in the U.S. Presidential election.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Two young Jews were arrested when they attempted to disrupt a performance of the Ukrainian Dance Co., at Lincoin Center by throwing bags filled with animal blood at the stage during the performance,

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Premier Golda Meir met for seven hours with a group of writers and intellectuals to explain her governement's reasons for refusing to permit the former inhabitants of the Lebanese border villages of Baram and Ikrit to return to rebuild their homes which were razed for security reasons in 1948.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- The two girl terrorists, who survived the attempt to hijack a Sabena airliner at Lydda Airport May 9 (their two male companions were killed) went on trial at the Sarafand Army base.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Rabbi Marc H. Tan-nenbaum, Interreligious Affairs director of the American Jewish Committee, reported that a survey of non-Jewish reaction to the Lydda Airport massacre showed that U.S. Christian leaders favor more pilgrimages to Israel.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- A government committee has recommended that cigaret commercials be banned from Israeli radio and from Israeli television if commercials are ever permitted on that media.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- In response to a rash of armed robberies the Cabinet has offered an amnesty to Israelis who turn in unregistered weapons.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Enginners of the Ministry of Communications are working on plans to combat Soviet jamming of Kol Zion Lagola broadcasts.

BON (WNS) -- The German Book Trade Committee has awarded its 1972 Peace Award posthumously to Janusz Korczak, the Polish-Jewish intellectual who volunteered in 1942 to accompany Jewish children to the ReTreblinka gas chambers.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Chicago industrialist Arnold R. Meyer has presented the Weizzman Institute of Science with a \$1.5 million gift for cancer research.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Dr. Gerson D. Cohen, Chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, announced the appointment of Dr. Edward T. Sandrow to the newly created position of special co-counsel to the Chancellor,

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Kozo Okamoto went berserk in his cell and was chained to his bed by his legs, prison officials reported.

TOKYO (WNS) -- Prof. Daniel I. Hillel of the Hebrew University's School of Agriculture, will conduct a joint research study with Prof. Tomoo Cho of the Agriculture Depratment of tokyo's Tottori Univerisyt, on an new irrigation system Hillel developed in Israel.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- The last of the Puerto Rican pilgrim group injured in the May 30 Lydda Airport massacre, some wearing bandages, left Israel for home,

NEW YORK -- The Israel Ministry of Commerce and Industry announced that exports of Israeli metal products totaled \$75 million in 1971 and have risen an average of 25% since 1965. By 1975, Israel expects to raech the \$185 million mark in metal exports.

NEW YORK -- Many Christian leaders and Christian religious publications, reacting to the recent massacre at Lod Airport in Israel for which the surviving assassin was sentenced to life imprisonment, have gone on record as condemning the brutal killings without reservation, according to a survey conducted by the American Jewish Committee. The indiscriminate slaughter took the lives of 26 people and left 80 woun-

LOS ANGELES, -- Mrs. Rose Adler Sperry, 68 widow of Leonard M. Sperry, an industrialist and civic leader in Los Angeles and Chicago, died at ther home here.

NEW YORK -- The American Jewish Committee today rurged the Congress not to take "precipitous" action on the matter of school busing, recommending that the issue be held over until after "the passions of the election campaign have passed and coolde."

NEW YORK -- A far-reaching program seek-ing new approaches to represent Torah interests before legislative parties and government agencies on federal and local levels has now been mapped by the Commission on Legislation and Civic Action of Agudath Israel of America, it was announced by Rabbi Menachem Shayovich, its national chairman.

NEW YORK -- Over one thousand families from the U.S. and Canada participated in the Israel Aliyah Expo 72, which took place in Hechal Shlomo, Jerusalem, from July 16 to 19. The Expo, which will move on to Tel-Aviv and then to Haifa, is sponsored by the Joint Aliyah Committee of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America and the Rabbinical Council of America, and Tour Vealeh of Israel.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Officials here refused comment on the expulsion of Soviet military advisors from Egypt despite the statement of Mohammed Zayyat, Egyptian Minister of Information, that the Soviet advisors were asked to leave in an attempt to bring peace nearer to the Middle East.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- I.L. Kenen, executive vice-chairman of the American-Israle Public Affairs jCommittee, told the Young Republican National Federation that the reduction of the Soviet military presence in Egypt was a vindication of Pres. Nixon's Middle East ploicy.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- A Senate-House conference report, which would ban Sabbath elections for local community boards in the antipverty programs was wsent to both Houses of Congress.
