President and Prime Minister Golda Meir talked with one another via satellite. The Intelsat hook-up makes possible, for the first time, the direct and live exchange of television programs between the 2 countries and improves phone service, both in quality and capacity. In addition to the phone conversation between the President and the Prime Minister, there was 20 minutes of live television from Western Europe, a shot of the astronauts at the Houston Space Center, and a four minute live performance by violinist Isaac Stern from the Israeli Room at the Kennedy Center.

Federal Communications Chairman Dean Burch attended the ceremony at the station which is located about 15 miles southwest of Jerusalem. Chairman Burch gave Mrs. Meir a letter of greetings from the President and was with her during the conversation. The Israel station is the 56th station to join the Intelsat system and gives Israel satellite communications with every Atlantic area nation.

Because this was such an historic event, I thought you would want to see the transcript of the conversation and a photo of the President taken at that time. Both are enclosed for your information. A copy of the letter from the President is also attached for your information.

TELEPHONE CONVERSATION BETWEEN THE PRESIDENT AND PRIME MINISTER GOLDA MEIR OF ISRAEL ON INAUGURATION OF SATELLITE GROUND STATION IN ISRAEL

**THE OVAL OFFICE**

**THE PRIME MINISTER:** Hello.  
**THE PRESIDENT:** Hello, Madam Prime Minister.

**THE PRIME MINISTER:** Mr. President, shalom.

**THE PRESIDENT:** Thank you very much. I want you to know that as I speak here from the Oval Office, where you and I have met so many times, that I extend the very best wishes of all of the people of the United States to all of the people of Israel.

I think this program, as I saw the countries you were talking to, instead of being called "Around the World in 80 days," could be called "Around the World in 60 Minutes."

**THE PRIME MINISTER:** That is right. Mr. President, it is extremely kind of you to take time off and speak to us. I can only tell you that the best wishes of all the people of Israel, appreciation, and all the friendship that we can express goes out to you and the people of the United States.

I remember the Oval Room very well, always with a great feeling of satisfaction and appreciation and joy and thankfulness that you have always taken so much of your time to listen to my long stories of troubles and wishes and so on.

But I must say I always came out with the right answers.

**THE PRESIDENT:** Madam Prime Minister,

I want you to know that you, needless to say, are always welcome here. I only regret that while I have visited Israel on other occasions, I have never been able to do so as President, but you can be sure that we will continue to work together for what you are interested in, what we are interested in, and that is a just peace in the Mideast which will protect the integrity of Israel, for which your people have suffered so much and sacrificed so much.

**THE PRIME MINISTER:** Thank you very, very much. It is easier to face difficulties when you speak as you do, and I know what you have done, so thank you very much.

There is a large group here. They are all smiling, and they are all happy to hear you voice.

**THE PRESIDENT:** I want to say just one last thing. I think the fact that we do have this new television communication will mean that the programs that will be carried from Israel to the United States, and from the United States to Israel will mean that more of our people here will have an opportunity not only to see Israel by television, but perhaps to go there as tourists and we hope that more people from Israel can come here. We hope that will be one of the dividends of this new program.

**THE PRIME MINISTER:** This is a commercial that will work both ways.

**THE PRESIDENT:** That is right. I know that I have enjoyed my visits, and we want you and any of your friends to know they are always welcome here in our country.

**THE PRIME MINISTER:** Thank you very, very much.

**THE PRESIDENT:** Thank you. We look forward to seeing you. Goodbye.

**THE PRIME MINISTER:** Goodbye.

**JUDY SHAPIRO SEEKS SOVIET VISA**

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Mrs. Judith Silver Shapiro of Cincinnati, wife of Moscow activist Gavriel Shapiro who was sentenced to a one-year term at "corrective labor" on July 26, announced she will seek an appointment with the Soviet Consul in Washington in an attempt to secure a visa to permit her to visit Moscow and marry her husband in a Soviet civil ceremony.

The Shapiros were married in Moscow in an Orthodox Jewish ceremony by an American rabbi on June 8 and again in a proxy marriage conducted by a District Judge in Washington, D.C. The Soviet government does not recognize either ceremony.

Mark Nashpitz, a friend of Shapiro's will go on trial August 2 on un-

reported charges the National Conference for Soviet Jewry said. The Conference also reported that Lazar Liubarsky of Rostov arrested July 18, has been charged with "slander of the Soviet Union;" also that Clive Barnes dance and drama critic of the New York Times, David Bar-Ilan, the Israeli pianist, Jerry Goodman, NCSJ executive director, and Jeff Kee of the office of Assemblyman Andrew Stein (D., N.Y.) met with State Department officials to discuss the case of Valery Panov a leading dancer of the Kirov Ballet Co. of Leningrad, who was dismissed when he applied for a visa for Israel. Panov was reported to be "desperate" and "deteriorating."

**SHAPIRO FRIEND GUILTY IN RUSSIA**

LONDON (WNS) -- Mark Nashpitz, 29, Jewish activist and friend of Gavriel Shapiro, was found guilty of draft evasion at a two-hour trial and sentenced to one-year at "corrective labor." Nashpitz will be permitted to live at home but will have to work at any job selected by the State.

Roman Rutman and several friends have been threatened with arrest for allegedly "having foreign connections" and "releasing political information."

Vladimir Markman, who was arrested April 29 in Sverdlovsk and charged with hooliganism, has now also been charged with distribution of Anti-Soviet propaganda and sending abroad information which is deleterious to the Soviet Union.

(In Jerusalem, 21 professors at the Hebrew University - Hadassah Medical School protested the imprisonment and forthcoming trial of Ilia Glezer, a biologist, who was arrested Feb. 7, a month after applying for a visa to Israel.)
