The Las Vegas taxicab strike is one week

old today, Friday, Aug. 25. More than 700 families of the striking drivers have received no income for seven days. It is reported that non-union drivers are reaping a harvest of more than \$100-a-day during the strike.

Pat Carver, negotiator for the largest idle cab company, Yellow, on Monday was quoted as saying: "All the struck cab companies are considering hiring nonunion drivers if the strike keeps up much longer.'

Let us hope this is just an idle threat for psychological purpose of advantage. Here is a situation where a serious condition could turn. critical. We have a different breed of driver behind the wheel today.

The last strikes in 1966 and 1969 saw some cabs set afire, although lawmen had a tight control.

Now there are less drifters and more family men who are not working. They are solid citizens with dependents and responsibilities. They have more seniority in their positions. They respect their work and will go to extremes to

keep their jobs.
We fear there is a strong likelihood they will be driven to desperate lengths to stop the scabs.

Leo Henrikson, secretary - treasurer of Teamsters Local 881, representing the striking men, said a ruling by the Taxicab Authority equalizing the number of working hours for ALL
