They predicted that protests would continue to grow in num-ber and intensity, but said Israel would not raise the issue at the UN where the Soviet Union could marshall "50 or 60 countries to neutralize" any such effort. The officials cautioned not to expect the governments to which Is-rael had appealed to publicly request the Soviet Union to cancel the increased charges. "If they approach the Russians quietly and very firmly, we will consider that a great acievement they said.

## Primary Roundup

Tom Mulroy is a candidate at the insistence of many, many civic and public-minded citizens. He recently retired as Clark County Registrar of Voters, where he performed to the satisfaction of everyone. He is a kind man, and an honest man and cannot do anything less than a good job if nominated and elected.

For the office of Justice of the Peace, which is non-denominational, eight candidates are

vying for the two seats. We have noted the career of Robert Reid one of the incumbants seeking re-election, since the day he was sworn to practice law, the first
