(Continued from Page 1) days or the visa will be revoked and they will be unable to apply for a new exit visa until two years after the date of revocation. Officials said that though there was no indication that the Soviet government was "backing off" from its policy of increased exit fees, they "take it as a good sign" that the USSR had not yet published the decree which makes educated Soviet Jews repay the Soviet Union for their education.

Opposition leader Menachem Beigin castigated the Soviet Union and read an official Soviet report that an average cost of higher education to the Soviet state was 949 rubles a year and was repaid by three years of work as a graduate. He said the Jews now discriminated against had worked "dozens of years" in Russia. Jacob Stein, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, told newsmen at Lydda Airport that the U.S. government "is very seriously concerned with this issue & is thinking through a possible course of action which can produce results."

EBAN TO BRING HIKED EXIT FEES FOR JEWS BY RUSSIA BEFORE U.N.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- In a report to the Cabinet, Foreign Minister Abba Eban said he would raise the issue of increased exit fees for educated Soviet Jews before the UN General Assembly and the biennial meeting of Unesco both meeting this fall. Eban reported there was a world-wide reaction to the "head tax" on Soviet Jewish scientist and that he "fully expected" the "clamor" to increase in the days ahead.

The Foreign Secretary reported that a number of friendly governments had pledged to make their voices heard on the issue and that there had been "assurances" from officials in the U.S. that the American government would "work toward a repeal" of the Soviet exit charges. Eban said that Israeli Ambassador Yitzhak

Rabin had brought to the attention of Congressional leaders the speech made by Premier Golda Meir to an extraordinary session of the Knesset regarding the Soviet Union's higher exit charges, and the text of the Knesset resolution calling on the USSR to repeal the charges. He indicated that U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Joseph J. Sisco had briefed Rabin on measures the U.S. plans to use to "combat" the increased visa fees.

It was learned here that six Jewish families had so far paid the increased exit fees, with one family reportedly paying \$25,000 for the parents and four sons, one of them nine-years old.
