



MARTY ALLEN TALKS ABOUT THE "NEW COMEDY" OF MIDDLE AMERICA

"I guess you'd have to say that I cover the backbone audiences when it comes to comedy," says bushy haired Marty Allen, the jolly "Hello, Dere" comic who's spent the last three years carving himself a brand new career as a single. Allen's found his niche, mostly by design but with elements of luck, and being in a lot of the right places at a

lot of the right times.
"By backbone," says Marty, "I'm talking about the middle-America audience – if you could call that a category - which in reality is the mid-stream of American society. Just putting aside, for the moment, the more-or-less "fringe" audiences that support black humor (the type, not the race), glib intellectual protest comedy, and the so-called slick nightclub humor, what's left is the big majority of nightclub and theater audiences who just want to laugh, at themselves, and have a good time. Sure, we all realize there's humor to be found in all the "revolutions" — political, sexual, social and racial — but there's still that need, through comedy, to just get away from all the pressures.

Allen's wrapped in a bright orange velour robe, coming down as he calls it from his second show at the Flamingo Hotel in Las Vegas. His dressing room is relatively calm and quiet, for a change. In the outer room, his wife, Frenchy, is on the phone and greeting backstage visitors. Allen's night is far from over; he still has a radio talk show to do, a 2:15 a.m. opening of his pal Rip Taylor at the Sahara Casbar to attend, and half a dozen "after the show" visits he's promised to make.

Allen's popularity soars incredibly in the television-oriented, non-show business capitals across the country. St. Louis, Dallas, Pittsburgh, Omaha, Indianapolis and New Orleans, to mention just a few of the dozens of cities and towns Marty's played to capacity swells in the past year, are indicative, says Marty, of what really makes America laugh.

'Humor is constantly changing," continues Marty, "but it changes in cycles. What an Archie Bunker can say on television today, or what such greats as Buddy Hackett, Shecky Greene and Don Rickles are doing in clubs now would have been considered shocking five or so years ago. There's much more freedom in comedy now, and it's given those of us in the laugh business, a powerful

communication with the people."
"My humor," says Marty "is meant to leave room for what I call Non-Message comedy. I find that most audiences are only willing to cope with so many problems at a time. Today almost all humor is partly topical and satirical, and I try to incorporate some of that into my act, but I think it's time that more comedy went back to just

being fun and funny.

Allen's numerous visits to military bases, hospitals and clubs throughout America have convinced him. "Believe him," says a sober Allen, "there's nothing funny about an ing war - either outside or within our country Politics, a constant source of material, does have a humorous side to it but there's a limit to just how much ridicule and name-calling can be done by a performer. Entertainers should be a unifying force." People who know Marty Allen know he is an intelligent and dedicated man: he takes his responsibilities as a performer and as a citizen seriously. "There's a new brand of comedy coming up. says Marty, "for the so-called masses. And I'm happy to say that it's a positive kind of humor not negative. In my act, I use bits and pieces of political and "problem area" comedy but I hope I'm presenting it fairly, from both sides. What I try to show is that it is so important for all of us to work together. If I have learned one thing in my travels, it's that we must bridge all the gaps that are keeping our people divided - gaps like education, economic, religious, racial and generation.
