## ITEMS ABOUT GREENSPUN & PRICE IN TESTIMONY SWORN UNDER OATH

### NEW ARAB MURDER TERROR SWEEPS WORLD

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Arab terrorists unleashed a new murderous assault throughout the world to spread panic and destruction.

The method used was an explosive device about the size of a teabag. It looks like an adhesive tape strip. Opening the letter triggers a percussion cap that detonates the explosives.

More than 40 such

letters turned up in more than a dozen cities in Europe, North America, Africa and Israel itself. They were addressed to Israeli diplomats and officials.

The explosion also seriously injured Kaddar Theodor, Mr. Shechori's successor.

The murder triggered worldwide reaction.

In Israel, Foreign Mi-

nister Abba Eban declared that the fact that the Arab terrorists can "act freely unhampered in Germany and Great Britain indicate that these countries are not fully sovereign. I do hope these countries open their eyes and change their liberal policy."

Deputy Prime Minister Yigal Allon suggested that the current wave of Arab terrorism will inevitably discourage the Israelis from making concessions that could lead to a Middle East peace.

Jews and Christians alike condemned the action.

The lethal letters were mailed from Holland. Police in Israel warned the public to beware of suspect mail especially parcels that appear to contain gifts

of books or candy.

Postal officials said the mailings were acts of intended cold-blooded murder because they can kill anyone who handles them.

Belgian police began a systematic inspection of luggage and control of passengers' identity in several Belgian railroad stations after receiving information of possible attacks against the Trans-European Express going and coming from West Germany.

In New York, postal authorities seized three envelopes that reportedly contained potential explosive devices earmarked for three Israeli diplomats: Yosef Tekolah, Ambassador to the UN, Jacob Barmore, Ambassador, and Uri Gordon, Minister Plenipotentiary.

### MIDEAST PROBLEMS ON UN AGENDA

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- The General Assembly opened amid the tightest security precautions in more than a decade as incidents of violence and warfare in many parts of the world increased fears that terrorist acts might be perpetrated at the headquarters of the world organization.

It was the 27th session of the UN.

Immediately, in a move that is expected to defuse debate over the questions of terrorism, Secretary General Kurt Waldheim recommended that the issue be initially referred to the Assembly's Sixth Com-

mittee which handles legal matters.

Still, the issue of terror, hijacking and the Mideast was high on the agenda of the UN.

Observers here feel that Trepczynski's statement and statements by others, early in the session is an indication that Israel will come under heavy fire during subsequent sessions from the Soviet Chinese Arab bloc.

### ISRAEL MAY POLICE LEBANON

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Israeli sources reported that Israeli troops might have to be used to police "Fatahland," the southern portion of Lebanon on Israel's border, because of Lebanese government "inactivity" against the terrorist groups in that section.

The sources said Israel could not accept indefinitely the weakness of the Lebanese government and its resulting inactivity against terrorists in "Fatahland."

According to the source, since the Six-Day War, 64 Israelis have been killed and 274 injured along the Lebanese-Israeli border.

### Sun's Print for Mint

If and when it comes to it we would not like to see Sun columnist Paul Price put in jail. And the same goes for his boss, Sun publisher Hank Greenspun.

The reason for our soft attitude on so extreme a penalty for their ignoble deeds is because an apathetic public and those who profited by their poisonous penmanship, are a large part responsible for their heinous actions. Of course, the major portion of the blame must be leveled against Greenspun and Price, who have been using the space under their names in their columns for so long to further their own financial interests and benefits, they themselves, believe it to be proper and justifiable. We say it is not.

It has been pointed out to us that the infringements we claim are happening, are not, technically speaking, crimes, merely violations of newspaper ethics. We disagree.

A newspaper is a public trust, just as an elected official, and somewhere, somehow, a violation of this public trust must be punishable. The reason there is no law on the books, that we know of, to bring a corrupt newspaperman to task, is because in every instance heretofore when a publisher is informed of outrageous acts by a columnist, the employee is discharged or at least curtailed in future violations. Unfortunately, the Las Vegas Sun has a publisher in the same boat with his columnist, and so the only higher authority we can turn to is the reading public to determine the honesty of accusations and establish justice where it belongs.

Hank Greenspun, by his column of Sept. 22, 1972, has chosen to become publicly involved in a controversy raging between Paul Price and Clark County District Attorney Roy Woolfer. We say publicly involved at this time, because he has been privately involved, up to his ears, for many months now, ever since Woolfer gave his damaging accusations in a sworn deposition. Woolfer's statements, under oath, charging Price with extortion, were made in a civil libel action by Price, who lost an election of city commissioner two years ago.

There you have the general background of incidents leading to Greenspun's column. Now we will delve into particulars to show you exactly how devious the Sun publisher can be in his
