CONDITIONS WORSE FOR RUSSIAN JEWS

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- The exorbitant visa fees demanded by Soviet authorities from educated Jews seeking to immigrate to Israel is only "the first stage of a horrible trap the Russians are preparing for Jews there," Premier Golda Meir charged. Mrs. Meir said that the ransom plan is not only aimed at Jewish academicians, but is part of a plan aimed at all Russians.

Meanwhile a Jewish Agency official reported that the character of immigration from the Soviet Union to Israel has changed as a result of the new exit visa fees. The fees have not however, affected the volume of immigration, Yehuda Dominitz, deputy director

of the agency, said. He reported that 55,000 newcomers are expected in Israel by the end of this year, the highest number since 1963.

Two Soviet Jewish activists who arrived in Israel reported that conditions in the Soviet prison camps are deteriorating. Arkady Volo-

shin and Lazar Abramovich Trakhtenberg also confirmed that Sylva Zalmanson Kuznetsov, the 28-year-old engineer serving a ten-year term for allegedly sky-jacking a plane, was transferred from the Potma labor camp in order to be put in solitary confinement for 6 months.

DISCUSS EXIT FEE WITH ROGERS

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- After meeting with Secretary of State William P. Rogers to discuss the imposition of exit fees on Jews wishing to leave the USSR, three Jewish leaders indicated that they were greatly encouraged by that meeting. Max Fisher of Detroit, Richard Maass chairman of the National Conference on Soviet

Jewry, and Jacob Stein chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, expressed support for Nixon diplomatic efforts, but also stressed the need for concurrent action in Congress, to bring an end to the exit tax.

White House Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler also announced that the matter of the visa tax had been discussed at President Nixon's meeting with Soviet Foreign Minister.

JACKSON AMENDMENT ON EXIT FEE

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D. Wash.) warned the Soviet government, the Nixon administration and all parties involved in trade negotiations with the Soviet Union, that they will have to answer to Congress on the issue of the Soviet exit fees imposed on Jewish emigrants.

Jackson has proposed an amendment to the trade bill that states that after Oct. 15, 1972, no nation shall be eligible to receive most favored nation treatment if it denies its citizens the right or opportunity to emigrate, or proposes other than a nominal tax on emigration.

Rep. Charles Vanik (D. Ohio) has introduced a similar amendment in the House.

SYRIA'S TERRORIST NAVY

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Following reports that Syria is establishing a maritime fedayeen unit under its Navy's command, the Israeli Navy this week instituted

measures to prevent terrorist naval operations.

Since the Syrian Navy has almost negligible deployment of naval forces in the Mediterranean, sources claim Damascus has decided to create a small guerrilla movement as a substitute for enlarging its own navy. Terrorist recently increased their naval units and are known to possess some motorboats and possibly speedboats. They reportedly have bases inside populated coastal villages and townships in Lebanon and Syria.

Meanwhile, reports from the Golan Heights say that significant movement of troops and equipment was visible this week along the Syrian border. This report may have some connection with Syrian and Soviet contentions that Israel is planning an attack against Syria in the near future.
