



WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D. Wash.) warned the Soviet government, the Nixon administra-tion and all parties involved in trade negotiations with the Soviet Union, that they will have to answer to Congress on the issue of the Soviet exit fees imposed on Jewish emigrants.

Jackson has proposed an amendment to the trade bill that states that after Oct. 15, 1972, no nation shall be eligible to receive most favored nation treatment if it denies its citizens the right or opportunity to emigrate, or proposes other than a nominal tax on emigration.

Rep. Charles Vanik (D. Ohio) has introduced a similar amendment in the House.

------NIX ON NIXON

There is an imaginary pendulum sweeping slowly back and forth across this great country of ours that serves as an equalizer to bring us to a rational level no matter what the disturbance.

It appears that wherever there is a lobsided imbalance in any direction, the varied crosssection of our population rises to the occasion to bring us back on our even keel. It never fails,

When industry and big business ran wild at the turn of the century, the unions came into being. When unions became gangster-dominated, honest organizers came to the rescue. During prohibition, when organized crime ran the country, relief seemed impossible until special prosecutors turned the tide. And so it goes,

The American people manage to cope with all situations that get out of hand. We are complacant to a degree, until our indignation is aroused and then the transition begins to come about. Now the problem is inflation.

The citizens of our country are sick and tired of the high cost of living. Those of us who are working are making higher wages and we live on a higher level, but we are always fighting the bill collector. We enjoyed this hand-to-mouth existence while we were getting into it, mainly because our standard of living kept rising. But now we are beginning to realize the price we are paying. We are unhappy. So now comes the rebellion.

The only way to combat the evils of inflation is to eliminate the administration that is keeping it in effect. That is the main reason why the voters of America will remove Pres. Nixon on Nov. 7.
