It is a simple matter for the State of Israel to jail Meir Kahane. There can be no charges of anti-Semitism as could be the case in the U.S. Nor need there be any sensitivity in Israel about the matter.

However, disposing of Kahane is not that easy because it is not Kahane that matters, but the underlying causes. What does he represent? Obviously, he fulfills the needs and acts out the feelings of many Jews, those who are fearful and frustrated. The imposition of law and order will not solve the problem although it might place either Kahane or his lieutenants beyond the pale.

However, a Mister X will spring up into his place. In some ways, the situation is equivalent to American crime in the streets. There are some who shout for law and orderand others who plead the cause of the cause. Violators or perpetrators as the New York Police call them, should be punished. Kahane's followers should suffer a similar fate if they contravene the established law.

But what about Arab terrorism? How will any success of any size on the part of the JDL solve that problem? It won't, because the roots lie in the situation on Middle Eastern soil, just as crime in the U.S. lies deeper than law and order.

Frustration in the world leads its inhabitants to disorganized and individual excesses. They may release tension and obtain some satisfaction. But they do not wipe out disease and the symptom moves elsewhere. It would seem that a firm application of both law and order and attempts to remove the root cause would in the long run ease, if not solve, the problem. A return to law might vitiate the need for order as people who are policeminded see it.

Nixon's first promise, at the opening of this campaign, was that there would positively be no increase in taxes. Now that promise is being revised. The President is talking of a 250 billion dollar ceiling as a government spending budget. The onus, says Mr. Nixon, is on congress to set that level. The President does not know, at this stage, whether higher taxes will be necessary.

George McGovern, the Democratic nominee, is a little more definite on what should be done about our present tax structure. Very simply, McGovern seeks to tax all income. He is hitting at the loophole escapes currently in effect by the present administration. McGovern's major objection on this issue is that lower levels of income are getting hit more than the higher levels are being relieved. The Democratic office seeker promises no higher taxes for wage earners. We would prefer McGovern to advocate a decrease in taxes for wage earners, but I guess we can't have everything. Since there are more wage earners than wage payers McGovern should be supported by a preponderance of the vote on this issue.

Insofar as the 250 billion ceiling called for by Nixon, Democratic financial authorities maintain that proposed ceiling will not hold, and it will be necessary to increase taxes to cope with government expenditures.

The whole problem of inflation does not evolve strictly around taxes. Food and clothing prices, rent, entertainment and practically every expenditure in our daily living keeps going higher and higher. We've been accepting this state of affairs while enjoying the fruits of higher income. But it isn't adding up right at the end of the month when we tally our balance. So we start looking around to see what is wrong. And we are just beginning to find out. The cost of living is out of proportion to the income. And so we are unhappy, and unhappy people do something about it.

The only thing we can do is to change the administration. McGovern's opening pitfalls were flaunted by the Republicans until they started overflowing out of our ears. But now we are taking a real look at the issues. We have on the one hand a man who has broken his word on every major issue. On the other hand we have

a man who promises not to lie and to erase corruption. The choice is evident. We must and will give the new man a chance to prove his integrity and sincerity.

Corruption exists at every level of our government. Who will deny this? The complacancy of the American public is giving ground to indignancy. (This is the pendulum swinging back.)

The war issue is important, of course. But all arguments, pro and con, appear to be lost in an overwhelming trend to get it over with, now, immediately. We're tired of it. We don't want it anymore. The only way to eliminate it without further ado is by ousting Nixon and electing McGovern. That's how the voters will see it.

Coping with the drug and crime problems is not satisfactory under the present administration. We do not blame Nixon, but we are unhappy with the current state of affairs and want to do something about it. McGovern may be the answer.

There is another, very important reason why the majority of voters will support George Mc-Govern on Nov. 7. Although it is not an issue, it will reflect a sentiment displayed by Americans since 1776. We do not go for a man, or a party that takes our acceptance for granted. A candidate has to prove his merit by coming out and facing us with his honest intentions. Truman proved that in the 1948 election when Dewey had 90 percent of the press in his pocket.

Especially in Nevada, where we enjoy more private and public liberties than in any other state of the union, we refuse to have anything or anybody thrust down our throats. We demand face to face honest and proven facts to back up a stand. All the polls and odds-makers cannot sway us from doing the right thing. In our state where gambling is legal, we love an underdog with stamina. We do not appreciate a Democratic governor's begrudging support of the Democratic candidate. We will not allow the cards to be stacked, whether it is in a poker game or a presidential election.

And not only in Nevada, but throughout the entire country, McGovern has an American tradition going for him that is unbeatable. He is working hard for the election, just as he did for the nomination.

While the Democratic nominees for president and vice president are state-hopping continuously to bring their platform to the public, the Republican nominees are sitting it out at luncheons or on the golf course with celebrities. The final tally will prove how to win an election, American style. The voters will show that determination is more potent than complacancy.

And so, the average citizen will not exactly be on the McGovern bandwagon. He will vote to get rid of Nixon.

Some believe that it speaks about death. It doesn't. The opening words, yisgadal v'yiskadash shmay rabbah, are an Aramaic salute to God, not cry of rebellion, as some would surmise considering the bitterness we feel when

May the sublime peace of heaven And life Be on us and all Israel And say, now Amen.
