NEW YORK (WNS) -- Despite President Nixon's sweeping victory -- including almost tripling the Jewish vote since 1968 -- Sen. George McGovern nevertheless retained 61 percent of the Jewish vote nationally.

Available returns showed that the heaviest volume of Jewish votes for Nixon were registered in areas beset by racial tensions as in areas of Michigan where bussing has been a major issue and in the Canarsie district of New York. In some parts of New York City, Nixon's stronger showing among Jewish voters was attributed to the heavy support he received in Orthodox and Hassidic neighborhoods. But the Jewish vote for McGovern was higher than that of any other white

Both parties had made intensive efforts to win over Jews on such issues as Israel and Soviet Jewry. Some evidence that this played an important role was in Ohio where Rep. Charles Vanik, a non-Jewish Democrat, won a 10th two-year Con-gressional term with 92 per cent of the Jewish vote. Vanik introduced an amendment to the East-West Trade Act opposing most favored nation status and other trade concessions to the Soviet Union until Moscow cancels its head tax. McGovern also won 52-54 per cent of Ohio's Jewish vote.

claimed that a million Soviet Jews want to leave Russia and said Israel must demand that the U.S. government increase its pressure on the Kremlin.

The big buzz in Nevada was the upset victory of Republican Dave Towell over Jim Bilbray for U.S. Congress. Bilbray had taken the Democratic nomination away from WalterBaring, who had held the post for 20 years. It was a

Political analysts are attempting to explain Bilbray's defeat. He had a young image. He was overconfident. He had too many heavy endorsements in his corner which made the voters a trifle suspicious.

We're inclined to lean toward the latter reason. It wasn't the number of endorsements that killed Bilbray's chances, it was the weight that led to defeat. Most damaging were the front page editorials in the Las Vegas Sun and the Gover-nor's impassionate plea, which fell on deaf ears. Who could have confidence in a Republican publisher jamming his readers with nonsense about how they should listen to him because he was much smarter than the voters. Or, a Democratic governor, who never said a word in support of the Democratic nominee for President. Even the Democrats who voted for Nixon resented the Governor's indifference to his own party's candidate.

PANORAMA was the only newspaper in Las Vegas that supported Dave Towell, Ralph Petillo's entertainment weekly, with its 70,000 circulation, the largest in the state, never attempted to insult the intelligence of its readers. In a series of stories, facts were presented on the issues. This probably was the determining factor.

The defeat of Bob Reid for Justice of the Peace is but a detour of a brilliant legal mind on the way to prominence in the world of jurisprudence. His loss as a public servant is the gain of those who will become his clients during the years he is in private practice.

The shedding of crocodile tears over Reid's defeat by a columnist who caused that defeat is another example of the insufficiency of the press in Nevada. They did the same thing to Lincoln, who came back stronger than ever.
