## DAYAN SEES RENEWED HOSTILITIES WITH EGYPT DICTATING TO SYRIA

### PERON MAY FUSE ANTI-SEMITISM

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- World Zionist Organization Department of Information director Avraham Shenker said the return to Argentina of Juan D. Peron after 17 years in exile might fuse anti-Semitic feelings in Argentina and has frightened some Jews.

Meanwhile a series of articles in the New York Daily News maintain that Martin Borman, former Nazi Party Chancellery Chief and Hitler's secretary is still alive and prosperous in Argentina, and that he sneaked into Ar-

gentina in 1948 "with the knowledge, if not under the personal supervision" of Peron, a pro-Nazi colonel.

These reports have been greeted with skepticism by such well-known Nazi hunters as Simon Wiesenthal, director of the Nazi war crimes documentation center in Vienna, and Tuvia Friedman of Haifa.

A West German Interior Ministry spokesman expressed "extreme reservations over the reports, and the Israeli press paid scant attention to the story.

### JEWISH DAY SCHOOL EXPANSION

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (WNS) -- Agudath Israel of America's 50th national convention has adopted a resolution containing warnings of "an impending explosion on the Jewish scene unless the priorities of Jewish federations are re-ordered." For the 1000 convention delegates the major problem

on the Jewish agenda was how to maintain and expand the Jewish day school movement--"the only sure means of guaranteeing Jewish survival."

The resolution said the Jewish Federation of New York was "one of the most flagrant culprits in a lopsided system of priorities, which places maximum Jewish education at the bottom of the totem pole, while concentrating on physical services which are increasingly a government responsibility."

The organization adopted a resolution denouncing Israel's Ashkenazic Chief Rabbi Shlomo Goren's ruling removing the taint of bastardy from Hanoch and Miriam Langer, charging him of "bowing to the demands of Israel's secular establishment that the Torah and Jewish law be altered to conform to the so-called needs of present times," and of acting in an "underhanded, secret and lightning-like manner...in defiance of all the leading halachic and torah authorities."

### JERUSALEM (WNS)

-- Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, addressing 200 Anglo-Jewish leaders, said he saw little chance of peace on the Golan Heights, predicted that Syria would respond to any Egyptian call for renewed hostilities against Israel. He raised the prospect that even Jordan, "the most moderate of Arab countries," might not be able to resist the pressure from other Arab states if they decided to fight Israel again.

Dayan said the Syrians were unlikely to reach any accord with Israel because they refuse to recognize its existence, and noted that if Egypt decided to re-

new hostilities against Israel, Syria would heed Cairo's call though he doubted the Syrians could be effective. Dayan also expressed doubt that Jordan could seek a separate peace agreement with Israel if only because the other Arab states would not permit such a move.

Dayan later warned that renewed fighting in the Golan Heights could "ruin any chances for a settlement." He said internal troubles in the Arab countries, especially Egypt, might cause Arab leaders to lose their sense of balance and escalate military or political warfare to force concessions from Israel.

### SYRIA TENSE

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The Foreign Ministry said Israel is maintaining open lines of communication with the principal powers with which it has diplomatic rela-

tions over the tense situation along the Syrian border, indicating the seriousness with which Israel regards the situation on the northern frontier and its repercussions in the Arab world.

### Peron and the Jews

While most Jews took little more than a passing interest in the return of Juan Peron to Argentina, Jewish leaders are very much concerned with the anti-Semitism of Peron's supporters.

With stories in the news that No. 1 Nazi, Borman, had paid \$200,000,000 to Peron for sanctuary in Argentina, and the final chapter of the Eichman case, we bring you the following items:

LONDON (WNS) -- Tuvia Friedman of Haifa, responsible for tracking down Adolf Eichman in Argentina 12 years ago, and Simon Wiesenthal, head of the war criminal documentation center in Vienna, placed little credence in a London Daily Express claim it had "incontrovertible evidence" that Borman, now 72, was a prosperous businessman in Latin America. Friedman said if the report proved true the World War II allies should arrange to carry out the death sentence imposed on Borman at the Nuremberg war crime trials, because if he was brought back to Germany "there are still many Nazis there who would greet him as a hero."

Israel, meanwhile, has closed the Eichmann case with the payment of a \$10,000 reward to Dr. Luther Herman, a blind attorney living in a Buenos Aires suburb, who tipped off Friedman on Eichman's true whereabouts. He wrote to Friedman in Oct. 1959 that Eichmann was living in a Buenos Aires suburb and that his daughter was dating Eichman's 17-year old son.

HOLLYWOOD, FLA. (WNS)--Juan Peron's return to Argentina, and increasing economic and political instability in Chile are arousing uncertainty and fear among the continent's 800,000 Jews, and extensive assimilation, intermarriage and a widespread absence of Jewish education pose threats to Latin American Jewry's existence, the American Jewish Committee's National Executive Council was told.

Dr. Seymour P. Lachman, the Committee's Foreign Affairs Department director, told the Council, the agency's top policy-making body, at its annual meeting here, that some of Peron's supporters had been making openly anti-Semitic remarks, and that despite official disclaimers that Jewish community was apprehensive. He said Chilean Jews were under economic rather than political stress, because "President Allende is systematically attempting to crush the middle class, to which the overwhelming major-
