JERUSALEM (WNS) Moshe Dayan, addressing 200 Anglo-Jewish doubted the leaders, said he saw little chance of peace on the Golan Heights, predicted that Syria would respond to any Egyptian call for renewed hostilities against Israel. He raised the prospect that even Jordan, "the most moderate of Arab coun-tries," might not be able to resist the pressure from other Arab states if they decided to fight Israel again.

Dayan said the Syrians were unlikely to reach any accord with Israel because they refuse to recognize its existence, and noted that if Egypt decided to re-

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Dayan later warned that renewed fighting in the Golan Heights could "ruin any chances for a settlement." He said internal troubles in the Arab countries, especially Egypt, might cause Arab leaders to lose their sense of balance and escalate military or political welfare to force concessions from Israel.

LONDON (WNS) -- Tuvia Friedman of Haifa, responsible for tracking down Adolf Eichman in Argentina 12 years ago, and Simon Wiesenthal, head of the war criminal decumentation center in Vienna, placed little credence in a London Daily Express claim it had "incontrovertible evid-ence" that Borman, now 72, was a prosperous businessman in Latin Amerca, Friedman said if the report proved true the World War II allies should arrange to carry out the death sentence imposed on Borman at the Nuremberg war crime trials, because if he was brought back to Germany "there are still many Nazis there who would greet him as a hero."

Israel, meanwhile, has closed the Eichmann case with the payment of a \$10,000 reward to Dr. Luther Herman, a blind attorney living in a Buenos Aires suburb, who tipped off Friedman on Eichman's true whereabouts. He wrote to Friedman in Oct. 1959 that Eichmann was living in a Buenos Aires suburb and that his daughter was dating Eichman's 17-year old son.

HOLLYWOOD, FLA. (WNS) -- Juan Peron's return to Argentina, and increasing economic and political instability in Chile are arousing uncertainty and fear among the continent's 800,000 Jews, and extensive assimilation, intermarriage and a widespread absence of Jewisn education pose threats to Latin American Jewry's existence, the American Jewish Committee's National Executive Council was told.

Dr. Seymour P. Lachman, the Committee's Foreign Affairs Department director, told the Council, the agency's top policy-making body, at its annual meeting here, that some of Peron's supporters had been making openly anti-Semitic remarks, and that despite official disclaimers that Jewish community was apprehensive. He said Chilean Jews were under economic rather than political stress, because "President Allende is symstematically attempting to crush the middle class, to which the overwhelming major-
