JERUSALEM (WNS) -- A Chilean scientific delegation is in Israel to discuss a two-year scientific cooperation program in the areas of water research, intensive agricultural and technological research.

NEW YORK -- The American Jewish Congress charged "countries that harbor and give sanctuary to terrorists" with "ultimate responsibility" for the killing and kidnaping of Israeli athletes at the Olympic games in Munich West Germany.

NEW YORK -- The American Jewish Committee called on the Olympic Games Committee to establish at all future Olympic Games a permanent memorial to the ll Israeli athletes who were murdered in Munich, "as a reminder to the world of the tragedy and sorrow that has befallen us and of the historic implications of this event.'

WASHINGTON -- A first-day cover commemorating the centennial of the mail order industry will be offered this month by the B'nai B'rith Philatelic Service, 1640 Rhode Island Ave., N.W. Washington, D.C. 20036.

NEW YORK -- The Zionist Organization of America has called on the U.S. to act unilaterally in the absence of international cooperation, in seeking to ostracize and isolate Libya for giving sanctuary to the Black September terrorists who hijacked a Lufthansa plane.



## JEWS IN ANTI-ISRAEL SPY RING

TEL AVIV (WNS) --Israelis were stunned by the disclosure that four young Israeli Jews were among the 20 members of a Syrian-directed Arab spy and sabotage ring that took its orders from Damascus. Most of the others arrested last week were Christian Arabs, disturbing, because the Christian-Arab community in the past had steered clear of anti-Israeli sabotage.


Daoud Osman Turki, a Christian Arab merchant and Israeli Communist Party function-ary, headed the ring. Dan Vered, 30, a teach-

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- A foreign aid bill that contains \$50 million for use by the State Department in helping resettle Soviet emigrants, mostly Jews in Israel, and \$50 million in economic support for Israel, was passed by Congress.
