Season of Own Freedom

Passover is called "the season of our freedom'' in Jewish tradition. Freedom for our ancestors had to have some purpose and that is why faith and a body of moral law were reconfirmed at-Sinai following the unshackling from Egyptian bondage. The first Passover set the mood of hope for a people destined to develop a religion and culture and way of life. This sense of hopefulness has been characteristic of the Jew throughout his history. It generates his faith and made possible his determination to survive meaningfully throughout the ages.

We are familiar today with the erosion of faith. It reflects the times. It is understandable in the light of the vast changes which are taking place before our eyes. But even more serious is a loss of hope. When the Jew sits down at the Seder table and reads the Haggadah it is not so much to philosophize about his past. It is an expression of trust that in time "all men will be free," that no one (not just the Jew) will be kept in chains, that Israel will be free and rebuilt, that American Jewry has a future. He can express these thoughts even in the midst of challenge and struggle not because he is a foolish optimist but because refreshed by hope, he anticipates a better world.

Healing starts when the patient begins to hope in the possibility of becoming whole again. The Jew at Passover does not know all that lies ahead. He only knows that there is a good chance for peace and justice and freedom. Between slavery and liberty, between stagnation and growth, the difference is hope.

ily defeated two no-confidence motions, by the Gahal opposition and the Rakah Communist faction, in the Knesset over this week's sharp in-crease in the prices of meat, sugar, fuel and other basic commodities, but faced scathing criticism by labor leaders and editorial writers and the angers of consumers.

The price of frozen meat rose by nearly 50 per cent and the price of sugar by 38 per cent. Finance Minister Sapir, the architect of the government's price policies, said the govern-ment could not increase price supports on those commodities and the consumer would have to hav part of the bill to pay part of the bill.

Sapir, replying to the motions for the government cited masses of statistics to show that inflation in Israel was no worse than in many other countries and that prices here are still cheaper than elsewhere. The average price in-crease amounted to 6 per cent. He said he raised the prices of meat, sugar and flour, rather than a wider range of foods including fish, bread and dairy products, to protect the poorer sections of the population. He noted that the poor would be compensated in the form of increased welfare payments.

But Yitzhak Ben Aharon, Histadrut secretary-general, denounced the government for decreeing the price rises without consulting the trade union leadership. The Histadrut Central Committee said it would insist that the total income from the price hikes not exceed IL 120 million and that poverty families and pensioners receive immediate compensation for the food price rises. A public opinion poll commissioned by Haaretz before the latest round of increases and published March 29 showed that 40 per, cent of the population was dissatisfied with the government's economic policies. Meanwhile, there was a rush on supermarkets and groceries to buy sugar, flour and other items before the increase takes effect.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The Cabinet has backed Finance Minister Pinhas Sapir's price increases last week on meat, sugar and other basic commodities, but urged that the joint government-labormanagement-committee on inflation be reconvened at the earliest possible date to consider measures to combat the rising cost of living.

Health Minister Victor Shemtov said he would propose a three month wage-price freeze aimed at preventing a chain reaction of soaring prices likely to result from the price hikes.

At the April 1 Cabinet session, Sapir noted the average Israeli's burden would be further eased by income tax reductions that went into effect.
