

JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- A new summer study project for Jewish learning and Jewish students, the Hillel Summer Study Institute, has been established by the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundations, according to Rabbi Samuel Z. Fishman, director of the national department of program and resources. The cost for the Lehrhaus, tuition plus accommodations, will be \$95. TEL AVIV (WNS) - Former Premier David Ben-Gurion, who after the Six-Day War favored returning all of the administered territories except East Jerusalem and the Golan Heights if the Arabs agreed to make peace, said he now favored Jewish settlement on the West Bank.

HOLLYWOOD, FLA. (WNS) -- American Jewish Congress President Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg said the primary purpose of Jewish life in the 1970's must be the transformation of Jewish organizations to they are "conspicuously designed to increase Jewish knowledge and commitment."

ROME (WNS) -- At the end of the most violent parliamentary sessions in recent years, with neo-fascist and left-wing deputies insulting and punching each other and hurling objects across the chamber as ushers struggled to restore order, Premier Giulio Andreotti rejected accusations that his government has been lax in preventing a resurgence of fascism.

PARIS (WNS) -- Gaullist Deputy Claude Gerard Marcus has called on Foreign Minister Michel Jobert to "undertake diplomatic action on behalf of Iraq's Jewish community," and to release any information the French Embassy in Baghdad may have on the fate of 16 missing Iraqi Jews.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The Nixon Administration is reported to be providing \$20 million in military sales credits to Saudi Arabia. Jordan is reported to be getting increases in U.S. military and economic aid.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- A public opinion poll has shown that 73 per cent of the Israeli public would like Premier Golda Meir to remain in office after the national elections next October.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Jews, and some non-Jews in the Soviet Union reportedly fear that a documentary film entitled "Beware: Zionism!", recently screened privately in Moscow, is the beginning of a new anti-Jewish, anti-Zionist propaganda offensive by Soviet authorities.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Three highly placed U. S. government officials told Jewish leaders at the annual policy conference of the American-Israel Public Affairs Committee that America's quest and need for petroleum will not alter its search for a peaceful Mideast settlement.

NEW YORK -- Rodney C. Gott, chairman and president of AMF Incorporated, has been chosen by the B'nai B'rith Youth Services to receive the first annual "National Leisure Industry Man of the Year" award, Mr. David M. Blumberg, president of B'nai B'rith, announced.

NEW YORK -- Fifty Russian Jews have been told by the Soviet secret police (KGB) that they will receive exit visas if they sign confessions implicating Col. Efim Davidovich, who is under criminal investigation in Minsk on charges of anti-Soviet propaganda and concealment of a secret weapon, the American Jewish Congress learned.

NEW YORK -- Thousands of poor Jews who have not understood how to qualify and apply for food stamps can now read about the food stamp program in Yiddish, thanks to the combined efforts of the American Jewish Committee, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and Columbia University's Committee for the Implementation of the Standardized Yiddish Orthography.

ISRAELIS AND ARABS CONFER

ROME (WNS) -- An appeal to Israel to withdraw from the occupied territories and to all nations to work for a peaceful solution in the Middle East based on United States Security Council Resolution 242 ended the Bologna Conference for Peace and Justice in the Middle East.

Delegations representing Israeli opposition forces sat in the same room with representatives from Egypt, Syria, Iraq, Morocco and Jordan and discussed the Middle East problem together for the first time since the 1967 war. But the absence of Palestine Liberation Organization representatives because of recent events in Lebanon was a disappointment for the organizers.

Israeli Communist Tawfik Toubi agreed with some of his Arab co-delegates that "small but courageous" forces in Israel are firmly opposed to what he called the "expansionist and oppressive" policy of the Israeli gov-

ernment. He said the Israeli opposition had come to Bologna not only in search of solidarity, but also to join a common fight for peace.

Other delegations included those from the Soviet Union, Soviet bloc countries; North Korea; North Vietnam and the Vietnamese Liberation Front; the United States; Canada; and several European and African countries.

WANTS SOVIET OUSTED

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Sen. Abraham Ribicoff (D. Conn.) renewed his demand in the Senate for the soviet government to recall G.A. Arbatov, director of the Institute for United States Studies at the USSR Academy of Science in Moscow, for "trying to blackmail the Congress and the American Jewish community and telling them how to behave on a great moral issue."
