talks between the parpute. His remarks were seen as a rebuff to Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman J. William Fulbright, who in a Senate speech earlier said that the great powers should impose a

S. position in the Security Council debate, according to Scali, to the United Nations is that the nations involved have accepted Resolution 242 as a basis for settlement and while each side may interpret differently the U.S. continues "to feel it is a fundamental framework whose continued exis-tence is essential." He added that when United Nations bodies have tried to reinterpret the resolution it has impeded the chances of negotiations.

How shall we view Jewish history? Is it but a succession of calamities and kashrut, or is there a manifest destiny in this seeming chaotic unfolding of events? Is the Jew the sad sack of the world, or is he a man of grandeur who proudly marches through the centuries, surviving where others have perished?

History can be compared to a vast smorgosbord, with the facts spread on a prepared table like exotic dishes, each vying for attention. There are two ways the historian can serve himself. He can close his eyes and help himself to a chance sampling of what the table has to offer, in which case he has that highly praised mode of history known as "objective". Most history, including Jewish, falls in this category. The result for Jewish history has mostly been boring dirges of suffering and pious recitals of righteousness.

But the historian can also help himself by selecting those facts that suit his concept of history, in which case he would have that highly criticized mode o history known as "interpretative". Few Jewish historians belong to this school. Regrettably, time has dated their works.

We prefer the second school, because -- to paraphrase an epigram by Oscar Wilde -- ob-jective history gives us the dates of everything
