The total amount from the U. S. Government to Israel amounts to approximately \$400,000,000. Broken down, this includes food surpluses and military credits in the amount of \$350,000,000, loaned at six per cent interest.

We thanked him for his consideration in meeting privately with us, explaining we had been asked to stay away from the earlier press conference called in his behalf. We do not see eye-to-eye with the powers that be in Las Vegas. Ambassador Dinitz told the story of the re-

ligious Jew cast adrift on a desert island. Three years later, when rescued, he proudly showed two synagogues he had built. "Why two," he was asked. "I don't feel happy unless there is at least one Shule I refuse to attend."

The Ambassador is a pipe carrier, who rarely smokes. He favors bright ties and simple, white shirts. His smile is ingratiating. It is refreshing to meet him, a delight to talk to him, and pleasurable regret to leave him. But you come away with the feeling he is a man of depth.

He told a Los Angeles fund dinner, "Israel has never lost a war, never will lose another war, but does not want another victory." This is compassion from the highest level. No wonder he is considered one of Golda Meir's closest aides.

Ambassador Dinitz was born in Tel Aviv and it was there that he received his primary and secondary education. After serving in the Israeli Defense Forces during the War of Independence, he came to the United States where he studied Political Science at the University of Cincinnati.

In 1951, Ambassador Dinitz moved to Washington, D. C. and in 1954 he completed his undergraduate studies at Georgetown University School of Foreign Service. Ambassador Dinitz received his M.S. in Foreign Service from Georgetown Graduate School, specializing in international law.

Between 1951 and 1958, Ambassador Dinitz was employed by the Embassy of Israel in Washington, D. C., in the Department of Information. During that period, he lectured extensively throughout the United States. In 1958, he was appointed Assistant to the Director of the Department of Information in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Jerusalem. In 1960 he was appointed Deputy Director and later, Director, of the Office of the Director General, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Jerusa-

In 1963, Ambassador Dinitz became Political Secretary and Director of the Cabinet of the Foreign Minister and from 1963-1966 he attended the United Nations General Assembly as a member of the Israel Delegation to the U.N.

In 1966, Ambassador Dinitz was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary to Rome and in 1968, he served as Minister of Information at the Embassy of Israel in Washington.

Ambassador Dinitz has written a number of articles on the subjects of Political and International Law.

He is married and the father of three -two daughters and one son.

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MURDERER FREE IN CHILE

NEW YORK Simon Wiesenthal, the Nazi hunter, said here May 31 that a major Nazi criminal is living freely and openly in Chile but cannot be extradited because of that country's 15 year statute of limitations on extraditable offenses.

Wiesenthal, in New York to receive an honorary degree from He-brew Union College --Jewish Institute of Religion, identified the Nazi as Walter Rauff, 66, who he said lives in Punta Arenas, Chile, and operates a prosperous export-import business.

He said Rauff was in charge of the mobile gas chambers -- trucks with Red Cross markings in which deportees were locked and gassed to death as they got off the trains -- and was responsible for killing least a quarter of at million people during World War II.

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
