WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Some Jewish leaders have been invited to the state dinner President Nixon will give for Soviet Communist Party Secretary Leonid I. Brezhnev at the White House, according to Dr. Henry Kissinger, Ni-

xon's national security advisor.

Meanwhile some 10 - 15,000 persons were expected to attend a "National Freedom Rally" here sponsored by the National Conference for Soviet Jewry. The rally will feature objects symbolizing Soviet oppression of the Jewish faith, the punishment of Jews wishing to emigrate and the bar to free emigration. Later at the Western White House in San Clemente the Southern California Council for Soviet Jewry will organize hold a candlelight march.

Brezhnev will be nowhere near either of the demonstrations. He is also expected to visit New York City or any other large city for security reasons.

Meanwhile it was revealed that the National Conference for Soviet Jewry asked the Southern California group to use "exercise caution" in its demonstrations. Jerry Goodman, executive director of the National Conference, said the plea was motivated by what might happen to Jews in the Soviet Union should any untoward incident be construed as an insult to Brezhnev or harm him politically within Kremlin circles.

In New York, the local branch of the United Nations Association adopted a resolution asking Nixon to intercede strongly with Brezhnev on behalf of the human rights of Soviet citizens and for the freedom of Jews and other groups to leave the country.

In Moscow seven Jewish scientists continued a hunger strike to protest the Soviet Union's refusal to allow them to emigrate to Israel. But other Jewish activists in Moscow have been warned by police not to demonstrate during Brezhnev's visit to Washington. Sources said that if they behaved their applications for emigration to Israel would be seriously considered.
