WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The fatal shooting of the Israeli air attache in Washington outside of his Chevy Chase, Md. home is being investigated by the FBI and Montgomery County, Md. Police. But neither the police nor Israeli circles would say whether the death of 44-year-old Col. Joseph Allon was a political assassination or a robbery attempt. Allon was shot as he was walking to his front door as he and his wife returned from a party at the Israeli Embassy.

In Jerusalem, Defense Minister Moshe Dayan told the Cabinet that there was no definite proof that Arab terrorists were involved in the murder. Foreign Minister Abba Eban read a message of condolence from U. S. Secretary of State William P. Rogers.

Col. Allon, who was one of the first pilots trained in Israel, had been at the Israeli Embassy in Washington for 18 months as deputy military attache and air attache. He leaves his wife and three daughters.

### MEIR TO NARROW SOCIAL GAP

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Prime Minister Golda Meir told a press conference here that she considers narrowing the social gap and improving the condition of children to be a major challenge facing Israel in the near future. She indicated her government will give serious consideration to the recommendations of a special panel on poverty which found that large number of children from families of Asian and African origin live in serious distress. The panel criticized the government for failing to cope with the problem.

### PRIVATE SCHOOLS STATE AID OUT

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Jewish organizations differed in their reaction to the Supreme Court's 6-3 decision invalidating all forms of state aid for non-public schools.

The Court specifically declared unconstitutional New York State's Mandated Service Act and all three parts of the 1972 omnibus bill which granted non-public schools in the state money for maintenance and repairs and provided tuition reimbursement for low-income parents and tax credits for all parents of children attending parochial schools. The Court also declared unconstitutional a 1972 tuition reimbursement law and upheld a lower court decision in Ohio against tax credits.

Rabbi Moshe Sherer, president of the Agudat Israel of America, said the potential loss to Jewish day schools nationwide was at least \$10 million.

### SUMMIT DEEP MIDEAST CONCERN

WASHINGTON (WNS) President Nixon and Soviet Communist Party Secretary Leonid Brezhnev ended their summit talks by noting they were still far apart on a solution for the Middle East conflict.

But they pledged to avoid a confrontation in the area. Brezhnev, in a television address to the American people at the end of his nine-day visit, called the Mideast situation "very acute."

Presidential advisor Henry Kissinger in a briefing on the joint communique issued by Nixon and Brezhnev, said the Middle East was "one of the most complex areas" discussed by the two leaders. He said the Arab - Israeli conflict was linked with the great power rivalry and Nixon and Brezhnev will discuss the Mideast again.
