WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The fatal shooting of the Israeli air attache in Washington outside of his Chevy Chase, Md. home is being investigated by the FBI and Montgomery County, Md. Police But neither the police nor Israeli circles would say whether the death of 44-year-old Col. Joseph Allon was a political assassination or a robbery attempt. Allon was shot as he was walking to his front door as he and his wife returned from a party at the Israeli Embassy.

Soviet Communist Party Secretary Leonid I. Brezhnev ended their summit talks by noting they were still far apart on a solution for the Middle East conflict.

But they pledged to avoid a confrontation in the area. Brezhnev, in a television address to the American people at the end of his nineday visit, called the Mideast situation "very acute.

Presidential advisor Henry Kissinger in a briefing on the joint communique issued by Nixon and Brezhnev, said the Middle East was "one of the most complexed areas" discussed by the two leaders." He said the Arab - Israeli conflict was linked with the great power rivalry and Nixon and Brezhnev will discuss the Mideast again,
