FIRST JEWISH SECY. OF STATE

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- A Jew will be Secretary of State for the first time in United States history if President Nixon's nomination of Dr. Henry A. Kissinger is confirmed by the Senate.

The President announced the nomination of the 50-year-old German-born former Harvard University professor at a news conference at San Clemente, Calif., after announcing the resignation of Secretary of State William P. Rogers. Nixon said Kissinger would also continue to serve as his assistant for national security affairs, a post he has held since 1969. Kissinger was born in Furth, Germany, and came to this country with his parents in 1938 as a refugee from Nazism.

Kissinger told newsmen that he will conduct U.S. foreign policy "regardless of religious and national heritage."

ISRAELITE ADS PAY

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Secretary of State William P. Rogers said that the status quo in the Middle East is unstable and undesirable for all parties concerned, but that the U.S. rejects an imposed solution. Rogers said the U.S. recognized the importance of the energy problem, but thought that progress would ultimately be made.

In a New York television interview, John Scali, U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, said that oil will not be the determining factor in U.S. policy in the Middle East.

Meanwhile Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, in a speech to the Denver Friends of Yeshiva University, asserted that while the U.S. needs Middle East oil it will not relinquish its support for Israel.

Also several American business and industrial leaders have rejected the claim by Standard Oil of California that the oil producing Arab states will curtail production or embargo sales because of U.S. support for Israel.

The Wall Street Journal in an editorial said: "The idea that to crush Israel they (the Arab States) would ignore their economic interests, or would turn charitable if Israel were sacrificed, strikes us as a view tinged with romanticism which has so fogged the Western view of the Middle East."

John K. McKinley, president of Texaco, Inc., attributed the oil shortage to technical lags rather than politics and Charles F. Luce, chairman of the board of Consolidated Edison Co., said that the U.S. need not let its fuel requirements become hostage to Middle East politics since it has more than ample alternative sources of energy such as coal.

CANADIAN JEWS RAP SOCAL

MONTREAL (WNS) -- THE CANADIAN ISRAEL COMMITTEE HAS ACCUSED THE STANDARD OIL CO. OF CALIFORNIA OF TRYING TO MAKE ISRAEL "THE SCAPEGOAT FOR A FICTITIOUS 'ENERGY CRISIS' IN ORDER TO WIN CONCESSIONS FROM OIL PRODUCING ARAB STATES AND TO CONDITION AMERICAN CONSUMERS TO ACCEPT HIGHER PRICES FOR OIL.

DENOUNCING THE LETTER BY SOCAL BOARD CHAIRMAN OTTO N. MILLER TO THE COMPANY'S STOCKHOLDERS AND EMPLOYEES RUGING THEM TO UNDERSTAND "THE ASPIRATIONS OF THE ARAB PEOPLE" AND GIVE "MORE POSITIVE SUPPORT OF THEIR EFFORTS TOWARD PEACE IN THE MIDDLE EAST," THE COMMITTEE CHARGED THAT SOCAL IS TRYING TO CONVINCCE CONSUMERS THAT THERE IS AN ENERGY SHORTAGE SO THAT THE CONSUMER WILL BE CONDITIONED TO ACCEPT HIGHER PRICES.

THE COMMITTEE, WHICH IS MADE UP OF THE CANADIAN ZIONIST FEDERATION, B'NAI B'RITH AND THE CANADIAN JEWISH CONGRESS SAID "PEACE IN THE MIDDLE EAST IS THE MOST EFFECTIVE GUARANTEE OF A CONTINUED SUPPLY OF MIDDLE EAST OIL" AND U.S. SUPPORT OF ISRAEL "IS THE MOST EFFECTIVE MEANS OF PRESERVING THIS PEACE."

New Rabbi in Town

Rabbi Shnairson served as the Spiritual leader of the Rosh Pina Synagogue in Winnipeg, Canada, during the years 1957-1966. In the course of that time the congregation grew from 450 families to 650 members.

Active in education on a community level, Rabbi Shnairson in 1961 established a Congregational Day School in his own Synagogue--a school, which achieved a reputation for excellence almost from its beginning.

In the existing Hebrew School of Rosh Pina, Rabbi Shnairson was responsible for raising the sights of education through better teaching standards and methods--by the engaging of better qualified teachers, through the standardization and expansion of the curriculum, and by attracting youngsters to start evening school at age six.

The Rabbi sparked a mortgage retirement campaign, which resulted in the freeing of the Synagogue from a large debt, and was active in the raising of funds for a major extension program for the building in 1966.

At Rosh Pina, Rabbi Shnairson was responsible for the engaging of highly qualified and experienced Youth Supervisors who, in collaboration with the Rabbi, reorganized the U.S.Y., adding special interest groups for Bible study, Hebrew Language, and a class in Hazanut (cantorial singing) for teenagers, according to a plan devised by Rabbi Shnairson.

The Rabbi worked with Sisterhood and Brotherhood to obtain camp scholarships and equipment for the U.S.Y. He was active in the selection of students and U.S.Y. members for attendance at the U.S.Y. camp in Webster, Wis., and Camp Ramah in Conover, Wis., and for the sending of U.S.Y. presidents to national U.S.Y. conventions. He sustained and developed Tallit Tefillin--Sunday morning Father and Son Services and Breakfast programs.
