Kippur. Most of the country's first inclinationthat something was going on came as people were leaving the synagogues following Kol Nidre when military vehicles were seen going along the streets usually deserted on Yom Kippur.

Call ups began Friday night and continued Yom Kippur day with many reserve being sum-

moned from the synagogues.

The attack came at 2 P.M. Saturday as many Israelis were resting between Yom Kippur services. Many people did not take the first sirens seriously until after Israel Radio came on the air.

Shortly before the end of Yom Kippur services a second siren warning came on and most people this time went to shelters.

Israel was put on total blackout.

Tel Aviv and Jerusalem tried to maintain normalcy Sunday. Schools were closed but most stores and offices were opened with skeleton crews. Housewives were out in force buying food although the government said the supply of food was sufficient.

In Jerusalem's Old City, Arab stores were closed but tourists continued to walk though on their way to visit the holy places. Lod Airport was closed although some 2,000 tourists left on flights home Sunday morning. Few of the 50,000 workers from Sunday although of the 50,000 workers from the occupied territories employed in Israel showed up for work Sunday although the territories were reported quiet.

Premier Golda Meir in a broadcast to the nation said that Egypt and Syria had planned their coordinated attack and spread lies that

Israel was concentrating troops.

She charged the Arab states with trying to surprise the Israelis on Yom Kippur when so many were fasting and in synagogues. "Our enemies thought that we would not be ready on Yom Kippur to face an attack," she said. "But we were not surprised." She said that Israeli intelligence had information that Syria and Egypt were about to launch an attack. Mrs. Meir said Israel had no doubt that it would be victorious and said "we are all called upon for responsible and disciplined behavior and to be ready for any sacrifice needed for our existence, liberty and independence, istence, liberty and independence."

Before the fighting began Mrs. Meir had called in U. S. Ambassador Kenneth Keating and other Israeli officials spoke to Western ambassadors urging them to prevent the Arabs

from attacking.

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
