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WASHINGTON (WNS) The Israeli Embassy in accuses Washington has re-leased a "pink paper" accusing the Soviet Union of blocking the Sovier exchange of prisoners ed" of war between Israel

and Egypt and Syria. The "pink paper" also declared that while International Red Cross representatives "regularly visit" Arab POWs, "so far Red Cross representatives in Egypt and Syria have not been permitted to visit any Israeli prisoners with the sole exception of six men

hospitalized in Egypt. Israel said it holds prisoners from Syria and Iraq and Morocco while Egypt holds about 350 Israeli prisoners and Syria approximately 130.

The paper also accuses Syria of the "most barbaric" treatment of Israeli POWs and said POW prisoners were "brutally murderby the Syrians. Among the victims were twelve Israeli soldiers who were blindfolded, their hands and feet bound and then killed. Earlier in a report from Arab Geneva, a Red Cross spokesman expressed fear that some 100 Israeli POWs were massacred by the

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Meeting in a large tent provided by the United Nations Emergency Force (UNEF), on the Suez-Cairo road, Israel and Egypt signed a six-point armistice agreement initiated by U.S. Secretary of State Henry A Kissinger.

The agreement signed by Israeli Gen, Aharon Yariv, a close advisor of Premier Golda Meir, and Egyptian Lt. Gen Mouhamed Gemassi, Chie of Operations at Egyptian General Headquarters, was the first signed by the two countries since the armistice agreement in Rhodes in 1949 which ended Israel's War of Independence.

The signing was witnessed by Maj. Gen. Ensio Siilasvua of Finland, acting chief of UNEF and chief of the UN Truce Observation Organization (UNTSO).

There is no armistice agreement or POW exchange with Syria and several groups demonstrated in Tel Aviv protesting the Syrian hands (Continued on Page 3)

## Oil Troubles Waters

Let us take another, more closer look at the oil situation.

The U.S. gasoline companies, which have large investments in Arab oil fields, started the panic, and possibly the war itself, months before the Arabs attacked on Yom Kippur. Standard Oil of California, Mobile and Texaco, propelled by Arab threats to curtail shipments. commenced a propaganda campaign to induce Americans to be more sympathetic to the Arab

The sneak attack wiped out all consideration, by Americans, for the oll countries. Of course, the swiftness and completeness of the Israeli fighting forces in dominating the warfare took precedence over any deals made between the Arabs and the U.S. Oil companies.

So now the Arab oil-producing nations are carrying out their threat. September production was slashed by 25 percent and reductions will continue at the rate of five percent a month. The Arabs are using their oil to blackmail the U.S. in the controversy with Israel. But the U.S. is not without retaliatory measures to insure the normal flow of commodities between nations.

The Arab states have obligations under treaties of friendship and U.N. resolutions. Some Arab nations have signed agreement prohibiting restrictions on exportation of products to other contracting countries, including the U. S. We also have a treaty of friendship with Saudi Arabia going back to 1933 and with Iraq since 1940.

It just happens that the Arab states are dependent on other nations, mainly the U.S., for food. A recent Dept. of Agriculture survey indicates Kuwait and Saudi Arabia import 100 percent of wheat and feed grains. Iraq, Egypt, jordan, Lebanon and Syria also depend to a large degree on food from other nations. In 1973-74 U. S. food exports to Arab countri are expected to total \$300,000.000.,\$50,000,000 more than in 1972.

It is interesting to note that while some of these food shipments to Arab countries are private sales, the bulk of the deliveries are through government-sponsored humanitarian food grants, loans and AID programs.

According to Near East Report, "the amounts may seem small compared to the money we pay for Arab oil, but the oil prices are vastly inflated by dollar-hungry Arab governments, while American food is provided, some of it as a gift, to feed hungry Arab people."

But while some alarmists are blowing up the
