The citizens of Nevada have every right to be confused, what with all the hogwash they are being dealt about who's going to run for what office.

While political pundits are wracking their brains with rumors of future aspirants, the outlook of Nevada politics is as obvious as Nixon being out before we go to the polls.

KISSINGER'S JOURNEY OF DISENGAGEMENT

WASHINGTON (WNS) Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger has made successive trips to Egypt and Israel in efforts to help the two countries reach an

agreement on the disengagement of forces. The trip, his third to the Middle East since the Yom Kippur War, was at the specific request of the Israeli government and at the invitation of the Egyptian government.

Before leaving Washington, Kissinger told a news conference that he will try to "transform general ideas" of Egypt and Israel into "concrete proposals" that the two sides can negotiate in Geneva.

Kissinger also stressed that disengagement would be only the first phase in the process to a final peace settlement and that negotiations for a final settlement will continue.

Meanwhile observers in Jerusalem believe that Kissinger is going to Cairo because he has received from the Egyptians some kind of positive response to the ideas given him by Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan when they met in Washington recently. The Israeli government, however, officially says it has not yet formulated a concrete plan and is waiting for Kissinger's visit to Jerusalem before doing so.
