NEW YORK: -- Nobel laureate Kenneth J. Arrow, professor of economics at Harvard University and president of the American Economic Association, will speak on "The Impact of the Energy Crisis" at a luncheon during the national convention of the American Jewish Congress in New York.

NEW YORK: -- Ten Christian freshmen and sophomore students at Moravian College of Pennsylvania have just completed a three week stay in Israel, to explore both the origins of Christianity and to understand better the living relationships between Jews, Christians and Muslims in the modern Jewish state. In cooperation with the American Jewish Committee's Christian Visitors to Israel Program, they visited many of the places in the Holy Land sacred to their faith, as well as Israelis in kibbutzim and in large cities.

CHICAGO --- A ""more representative" structuring of the American Jewish community to deal with "changing needs, changing life styles and the increasing burdens of inflation" was proposed by Philip M.Klutznick, a former president of B'nai B'rith and long-time advocate of greater communal unity.

WASHINGTON, D.C.--In a joint venture, the B'nai B'rith Youth Organization and the March of Dimes have set as their goal a healthier next generation.

JERUSALEM (WNS)-In advance of "Aliya Months" that will be held in various countries February through April to try to stimulate increased immigration from Western countries, Premier,, Golda Meir and the World Zionist Organization Executive have issued pleas to Jews throughout the world to come to Israel and "build the land" and stand "where the sustruggles preme of Jewish history are being waged,"

Praising world Jewry for its financial aid, Mrs. Meir declared: "But that is not enough. The meaning of a Jewish state is first and foremost an aliya-oriented state, a state to which thousands of our brethren will immigrate and in which they will be absorbed."

The WZO message said "that we must build a strong Israel" and that "Today, more than ever, Israel needs Jews who will come here on aliya and join us with their talent, energy, professional skills and devotion -- in building a free Jewish society, a commonwealth founded on values and deeds that shall attract every Jew wherever he may be."



Foreign Minister Abba Eban has admitted that the U.S. has suggested that Israel exchange views with Syria before the submission of a list. He noted that there were signs that Syria was willing to negotiate thru the U.S.

Meanwhile fierce exchanges of fire continued to be exchanged on the Syrian border with at least one more Israeli killed, Another Israeli soldier was killed when a patrol clashed with a terrorist gang from Lebanon near Kibbutz Dan in the Upper Galilee.
