Isareli Defense Minister General Moshe Dayan came here last week with a proposal for separating his army from Syrian military forces on the Golan front.

He met Friday and Saturday for about five hours with Dr. Henry Kissinger (just prior to the Secretary of State's wedding ceremony? at the State Department. As they were talking, heavy fighting continued in the Golan Heights.

Dayan used a map (which he carried in a brown paper bag) to explain Israel's position -which is said to include a limited pullback from Syrian territory taken in the Yom Kippur Day War; an exchange of all prisoners of war and the establishment of a six-mile wide buffer zone on the Golan front, which would be under control of the United Nations Emergency Forces,

Dr. Kissinger said Dayan's proposal was "much more detailed and much more elaborate" than previously discussed.

Because the Syrians refuse to negotiate face to face with the Israelis, Dr. Kissing will present Dayan's plan to representatives of Syria when they come to Washington next week after his honeymoon. And if he can persuade them to accept it, he plans to return to the Middle East the end of April to arrance a final disengagement of forces.

However, Syrian Vice President Khaddam said that there would be a price for any agreement on the disengagement of forces on the Golan Heights: insistence on an Israeli commitment to evacuate all occupied Arab territory and recognition of the 'legitimate rights" of the Palestinians,

Gen. Dayan said he left with Dr. Kissinger a detailed map of the battlefront on which were outlined the Israeli proposals for troop pulibacks

to lessen or eliminate chance of conflict between the two sides. He said the plan was Israel's "initial" move to try to reach disengagement agreement with Syria.

"We're trying to negotiate with Syria," Dayan added, "It'll take a lot of work to bring the two parties together. But I'm sure the Secretary of State will now make much effort to do so

Commenting on the present fighting, Gen. Dayan said: "We could do without the firing on the Golan front, but I doubt that it will deteriorate into general war,

Dr. Kissinger described his talks with Gen. Dayan as "very constructive and helpful". He

added that he expects to be able to work out a separation of the forces on the Golan Heights.
"We haven't heard the Syrian reaction yet, but we think we have a useful basis," Kissinger said. "I basically believe we will succeed as we did in the Egyptian disengagment in bringing together the points of view of the two sides.

The Soviet Union is disturbed that they were left out in the cold while Dr. Kissinger "wheeled and dealed" with the Israelis and the Arabs in the last Middle East negotiations. Dr. Kissinger has promised to keep them better informed as to his present and future negotiations. So, in mid-April, he'll also confer on his latest stand with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko who will be in the United States for a special session of the United Nations General Assembly.

At that time, he may also meet with Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmy of Egypt.
