

ROSALIND RUSSELL was honored by the Filmex (The Los Angeles International Film Exposition) and she deserves it. She has contributed so much to the art of motion pictures and I think most tend to forget that. We expect her to be great therefore we don't honor her as much. Filmex changed all that with 90 delightful minutes of clips from classic Russell films. Beginning with her second film "The President Vanishes" (her first was "Evelyn Prentice") made at the tender age of 21, we saw wonderful moments from "China Seas", "Craig's Wife", "The Citadel", "Night Must Fall", "Four's a Crowd", "The Women" (the epitome of bitchery), "His Girl Friday" (version of "The Front Page" with RR playing Hildy Johnson, the part that her pal JACK LEMMON will play in the new version), "No COUNTRY, SHOWTIMES -- 6 & 8 P.M.

Time For Comedy", "Sister Kenny" (one of the finest Russell performances and a special SHOW TIMES FOR UNSINKABLE MOLLY BROWN favorite of hers), "Mourning Becomes Electra"
"Picnic", "The Trouble with Angels", "O
Dad, Poor Dad, etc" and ending with "Gypsy" (now that we can forget about ETHEL MERMAN not getting the part, it's another great Russell performance. See it again and see for yourself). Filmex then treated us to a full-length, uncut screening of "Auntie Mame". I'm sure that I don't have to tell you that Rosalind Russell and Mame Dennis are positively one of the heat combinations in movie history. I think that it is one of the most perfect movies ever made. Frame by frame, it is total art. Sound like a fan? Bet your life and I stand not alone. The Paramount Theater was filled to capacity and when the indestructable Roz appeared on the stage, she was greeted with a five minute standing, cheering ovation. She said, "I've had two lovely opening nights in my career on Broadway, "Auntie Mame" my career on Broadway, "Auntie Mame" & "Wonderful Town" but I don't think that anything quite matches the love and warmth that is coming from you today". RODDY MC DOWALL sat with her and discussed her career but unfortunately, time ran out on us and it had to close before the audience could ask questions. JANE CONNELL repeats her hilarious Agnes Gooch, ROBERT PRESTON is charm personified as Beau, KIRBY FURLONG makes young Patrick believeable and lovable and BRUCE DAVISON makes the older Patrick believable and completely unlovable. Good support from reliables DON PORTER, AUDREY CHRISTIE, JOHN MCGIVER & LUCILLE BENSON (her Mother Burnside is a gas if you'll pardon the pun).


