# BEIGIN OPPOSES

NEW YORK (WNS) ---Any withdrawal by Israel from the territories occupied in the Six-Day War would mean that chances of peace would be destroyed forever, Likud leader Menachem Beigin warned here.

Speaking at the inaugural dinner of the Prime Minister's Club of the Israel Bonds Organization for the New York metropolitan area, Beibring peace since the Arabs "continue to strive to destroy us." Arabs He said if the West Bank were returned it would result in a holocaust unleashed on Israel's civilian population.

More than \$3,870,000 in Israel bonds were sold at the dinner.

Kissinger flew off to Amman, Jordan, as he continued his fifth while the Israeli Cabinet met for 4 1/2 hours to. decide whether Israel would make territorial concessions to Syria in return for the accord. Observers believe what Israeli officials tell Kissinger when he returns and how the decision is received by Syria is crucial for the success of Kissinger's mission. On his talks with Syrian leaders in Damascus, Kissinger sought to obtain their agreement to consider a Suez-style buffer zone metropolitan area, Beigin said that only an 'Emergency Force (UN
'invincible Israel' will EF) rather than the UN observers as the Syrians had insisted.

The Syrians were reportedly also prepared to agree to a prisoner of war exchange at the outset of disengagement But Syrian flexibility was said to be conditional on Israel's acceptance of its territorial demands.

Kissinger's talks with Israel have centered on the territorial issue. A HIGH U. S. official reportedly said that Syria and Israel are within "negotiating range" on everything but the question of territory. Kissinger is trying to persuade the Israel gov't. to give up the Golan Heights town of Kuneitra and the hills to its west. Officially Israel remains adamant against returning any territory except what was captured in the Yom Kippur War. But there seems to be a softening on Kuneitra but not the hills around it.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger arrived in Israel after visiting Algeria and Egypt and immediately sought to calm Israeli fears that he would pressure their government to make concessions endangering Israel's security.

diplomatic mission to "I came here to continue discussions with the Middle East. Mean the government on the same problems of peace and in the same spirit of friendship that characterized our previous discussions," he said upon landing at Ben Gurion Airport. "1 came to discuss not concessions but security. I came not to exert pressure but to attempt to reach lasting peace which this people, courageous and learned of suffering, deserves."

Foreign Minister Abba Eban, who greeted Kissinger and his wife Nancy also stressed the bonds of friendship between Israel and the U.S., which he said were strong enough to overcome differences of opinion.

Kissinger and his aides went directly to Jerusalem to begin discussions with Premier Golda Meir and her key ministers. Hope was expressed that enough groundwork could be laid during the current talks to set in

Because the primary elections are some distance away, we hesitate to commence the stories on political hopefuls, for which we are accumulating an extensive folder.

But we cannot pass up the opportunity to sing the praises of one man who stands head and shoulders above all others in public service, whether it be the local, state or even the national sphere.

Supreme Court Justice John Mowbray is man whose integrity is surpassed only by his knowledge, interpretation and dispensation of legal jurisprudence.

Our views are apparently no big secret to the public because Mowbray received the record number of almost 100,000 votes in Clark County when he ran unopposed for Supreme Court justice in 1968. He's running again and only a fool would compete with him.

We're going to disclose a story about "Big John" which indelibly stamped him in our mind as a man of honor, courage and rectitude,

It must have been about a dozen years ago when we were covering the distric court for the Las Vegas Sun. The hour was late. All business was over for the day. We were in our cubbyhole office toiling over an intricate murder trial. We heard footsteps coming down the corridor. It was John Mowbray, then a district judge.
