

> JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger returned here from his third visit to Damascus and seemed to be less optimistic about the chances of an Israeli-Syrian disengagement treaty. Upon arrival at Ben Gurion Airport he went immediately to Jerusalem to begin a working session with Israeli officials. Reporters who accompanied the American Secretary to Damascus quoted him as saying "We have made some progress but no agreement was reached." He added, "We had a very comprehensive review of the situation... We passed from the stage of general considerations to the stage of detailed and complete examination." Observers saw this as a way of saying that the Syrians are refusing to budge from their positions on territories, buffer zones and limited forces zones. One U.S. official reportedly said that Kissinger now knows what concessions each side has to make to reach an agreement, but is not sure that they will make them.

Israeli officials have expressed cautious optimism about the chances for progress toward an Israeli-Syrian disengagement treaty after Secy. of State Henry A. Kissinger returned here from Damascus where he had presented (Continued on Page 3)

of the Jewish community's most One seasoned sniffer-outers of anti-Semitic trends in the U.S. has been quoted recently as saying ... "the plain fact is that expressed anti-semitic sentiment, spontaneous and unorganized, has increased a hundredfold since the outbreak of fighting in the Middle East.'

Gather close, all ye of much faith, and hark: I just don't believe that. I work in an area where not many Jews abide; I keep my ears open while hunting for bargains in gasoline; I suffer from a lifetime addiction to reading all the letters-to-the-editor I can get my eyes on. And I must repeat, I just don't believe that the Yom Kippur War, the Arab oil shenanigans, the slump in retail prices, the reality of recession, and polarization over "forced busing" have stirred an anti-Semitic heart in fellow Americans anti-Semitic beast in fellow Americans.

In short, I go with those who assert that if ever there has been a brilliant example of a self-fulfilling prophecy, the pre-occupation of some Jewish leaders ( real and imagined) with a resurgence of anti-Semitism, may well lead us to such trouble. We may just talk ourselves into a crisis.

Better for us if we try to head the doomsayers off on the way to the panic barn. For if we are in a fix now, it's a brew of general American and certainly not primarily Jewish difficulty. If millions of our energy-hungry, Watergate-hounded, tax-weary overpriced, countrymen are looking for a scapegoat, they are not leeching on to you faithful few reading

Yes, we have all heard that this or that fellow has actually seen a bumper sticker reading "Burn Jews, Not Oil." (If you have, please write me and tell me exactly where and when.) And we know that Jews have taken far too many bumps for the commendable unwillingness of Israel to give up the Golan Heights and Jerusalem day before yesterday. But do you
