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JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Thirty persons were killed and scores wounded in the small Western Galilee town of Maalot following what Premier Golda Meir called "a bitter day, a day of horrors."

Among the dead were the three terrorists and 21 of the 90 teen-aged school children whom they held hostage for more than 12 hours. The three armed terrorists were slain when 50 Israeli troops stormed the building one half hour before the terrorists had said they would blow up the building along with their hostages.

Sixteen of the students were killed and 70 injured during the attack although it was not clear whether the children were killed by the terrorists or were caught in the crossfire between the terrorists and the attacking Israeli

Mrs. Meir, in a radio and television broadcast to a stunned and shocked nation, said the terrorists exploded grenades before the Israeli soldiers entered the building. One survivor (Continued on Page 3)

in the capital. Meanwhile in Jerusalem the Cabinet has decided to set up a commission to investigate the Maalot incident. The commission to be named by Premier Golda Meir will not deal with the military aspects of the tragedy.

A terrorist serving a life sentence in an Israeli prison described in an Israel radio interview how he had been taken blindfolded to Maalot to talk to the 3 terrorists who held the 90 students hostage. prisoner, Omar Mahmud Kassem, said he refused to speak to the terrorists although it had been made clear to him that an exchange of prisoners would take place and that he would be among the prisoners freed.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israel and Syria were reported close to signing a disengagement treaty which would take place in Geneva.

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger achieved the dramatic break-through just as he was about to return to Washington after three weeks of diplomatic shuttling between Damascus and Jerusalem.

But after Syrian President Hafez Assad

reportedly gave his acceptance of American "ideas" on disengagement, Kissinger returned here for another round of negotiations. After an Israeli Cabinet meeting Information Minister Shimon Peres said "I think the line of separa-tion offered by the U.S. is of such a nature that both sides could accept it." State Dept. spokesman Robert Anderson also told reporters in Jerusalem that both sides have in effect agreed on a disengagement line. Peres said that Kissinger is expected to make at least two more trips between the two capitals before the agreement is settled.

According to unofficial reports, the tentative agreement between Israel and Syria calls for Israel to return all Syrian territory captured in the Yom Kippur War and some of the territory taken in the Six Day War. The Syrian side of Mt. Hermon will be turned over to a United Nations force. The town of Kuneitra will be included in the UN buffer zone but Kuneitra itself will be restored to Syrian civilian administration. Three strategic hills Israeli settlements will be retained by Israel. The U.S. has proposed building a security
