

**EGYPTIAN, ISRAELI
AGREE PEACE POSSIBLE**

NEW YORK (WNS)-- Although achieving peace in the Middle East will be a long and difficult task, an Egyptian and Israeli agreed here on the need for Jews and Arabs to continue making the effort.

Arie Eliav, a member of the Knesset and a leading Israeli "dove" and Sana Hassan, a daughter of a former Egyptian ambassador to the U.S., came to this conclusion in a panel discussion at the 68th annual meeting of the American Jewish Committee.

Ms. Hassan said that there will not be a quick conciliation but "a slow, difficult and gradual process of peaceful coexistence." Eliav said a settlement will not be reached in this century but he hopes his children will see it.

Ms. Hassan said a solution requires a Palestinian state on the West Bank and stressed that if the area is returned to King Hussein of Jordan it will mean a continuation of war and terrorism. But Eliav said that the solution must include the one million Palestinians living in Jordan as well as those on the West Bank. He said Israel should declare on a high policy level what territories it is willing to give up for peace and use these territories as a lever to achieve peace.

Sidney Sover, senior Deputy Assistant Sec'y. of State for Near Eastern and South Asian Affairs, told the gathering that while the style and intensity of U.S. policy in the Mideast has changed "the substance of the policy is unaltered." He said the U.S. wants to bring the sides together to negotiate a settlement and to reduce Soviet influence in the region.

At the concluding luncheon of the four-day meeting, Israel's charge d'affaires in Washington, Mordechai Shalev said the U.S. is probably the only country that could have undertaken the peace efforts going on now. He said Israel will do everything to achieve peace guided by its responsibility to "guarantee that the security of our people will not be sacrificed." He said terrorism such as at Maalot will end "when the Arab governments decide to bring it to an end."
