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WARMTH, CHEERS GREET NIXON, 1st U.S. PRESIDENT TO VISIT ISRAEL

3 WOMEN DEAD, 4 TERRORISTS

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Four terrorists penetrated into Kibbutz Shamir at the foot of the Golan Heights killing three women before they were killed in turn in a battle with Kibbutz members.

Two of the terrorists were killed almost instantly by Uzi Tzur, a paratrooper who was a member of the kibbutz. The other two withdrew to the kibbutz bee-house and killed the three women, two of them members of the kibbutz ---Edna Mor, 20, mother of one child, and Shoshana Galili, 60, a grandmother. The third was a 22-year old volunteer from New Zealand. The third terrorist was killed by the kibbutz members while the fourth died when the explosives he was carrying blew up. Army units also rushed to the scene.

Gen. Mordechai Gur, Chief of Staff, said the terrorists entered from Lebanon dressed as "hippies" in civilian clothes. He said they found documents on them showing they had five targets, including Shamir, although it was not known if they had planned to attack all five.

The terrorists also had a large quantity of explosives, sub-machine guns, hand grenades and ammunition.

In Damascus, the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command led by Ahmed Jibril, the same group responsible for the Kiryat Shemona massacre, took credit for the attack.

NIXON'S TRIP WILL CEMENT AGREEMENT

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Israeli Ambassador Simcha Dinitz told a National Press Club luncheon that the agreements in the Middle East are still "fragile" and President Nixon's trip to the Middle East will cement them.

He said he believed Nixon's trip would further negotiations for a broader settlement and "institutionalize" and "institutionalize relations" between the United States and Israel. Dinitz called the Nixon trip "another milestone" in building a Middle East peace.

In response to questions, Dinitz said the possessions left behind by Jews forced to flee Arab countries will be taken into consideration when the matter of compensation for Arabs who left Israel is discussed. He agreed with a questioner that the approximately 600,000 Arabs who left Israel equals the number of Jews who have come to Israel from Arab countries.

Dinitz said the issue of a Palestinian state "can only be handled" within the framework of peaceful negotiations with Jordan.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- President Nixon arrived in Israel to a warm welcome from its leaders and enthusiastic cheers from large crowds along his route from Ben Gurion Airport to Jerusalem.

The tightest security in Israel's history was in force for the American President's arrival. President Ephraim Katzir greeted the American President with the Hebrew blessing of welcome, "Beruchim Habayim Beshem Hasholem," (Blessed be you who come in the name of peace.)

Nixon in turn expressed his conviction that what seemed as an impossible dream of peace in the Middle East in 1967 could now be achieved through the cooperation of all the nations in the region.

The two Presidents took note of the fact that Nixon's visit was the first by an American President, although Nixon had been here as a private citizen.

Nixon stressed the "traditional" friendship of the U.S. and Israel and praised the Israeli people. He said the U.S. was "proud to stand with Israel as we had in the past in times of trouble and now to work with Israel" to seek peace.

Katzir praised the U.S. for its aid to Israel and Nixon in particular for the demonstration of his "constant readiness to come to our assistance."

The roads Nixon took from the airport to Jerusalem as well as some streets on the Capital had been closed to traffic but they were lined with people shouting "Nixon, Nixon" and waving American and Israeli flags. The American President stopped several times in Jerusalem to wave at the crowds.

During his first day in Jerusalem, Nixon also visited the home of former Premier Golda Meir.
